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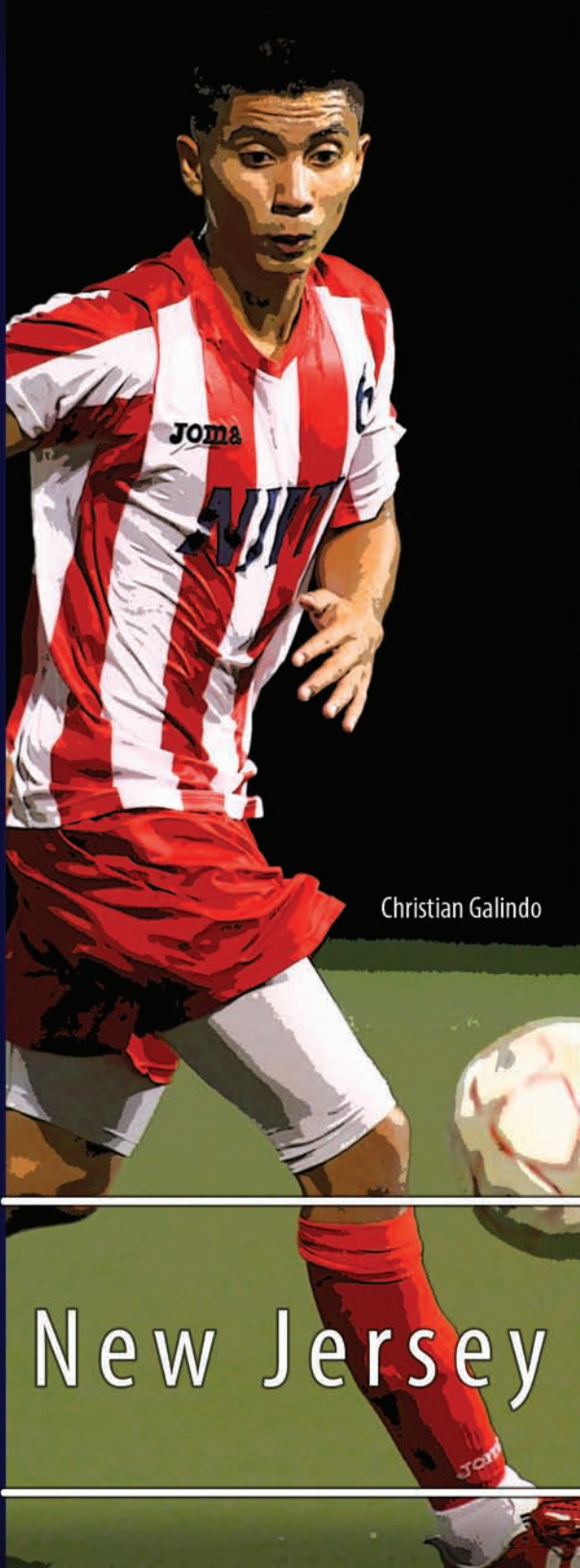
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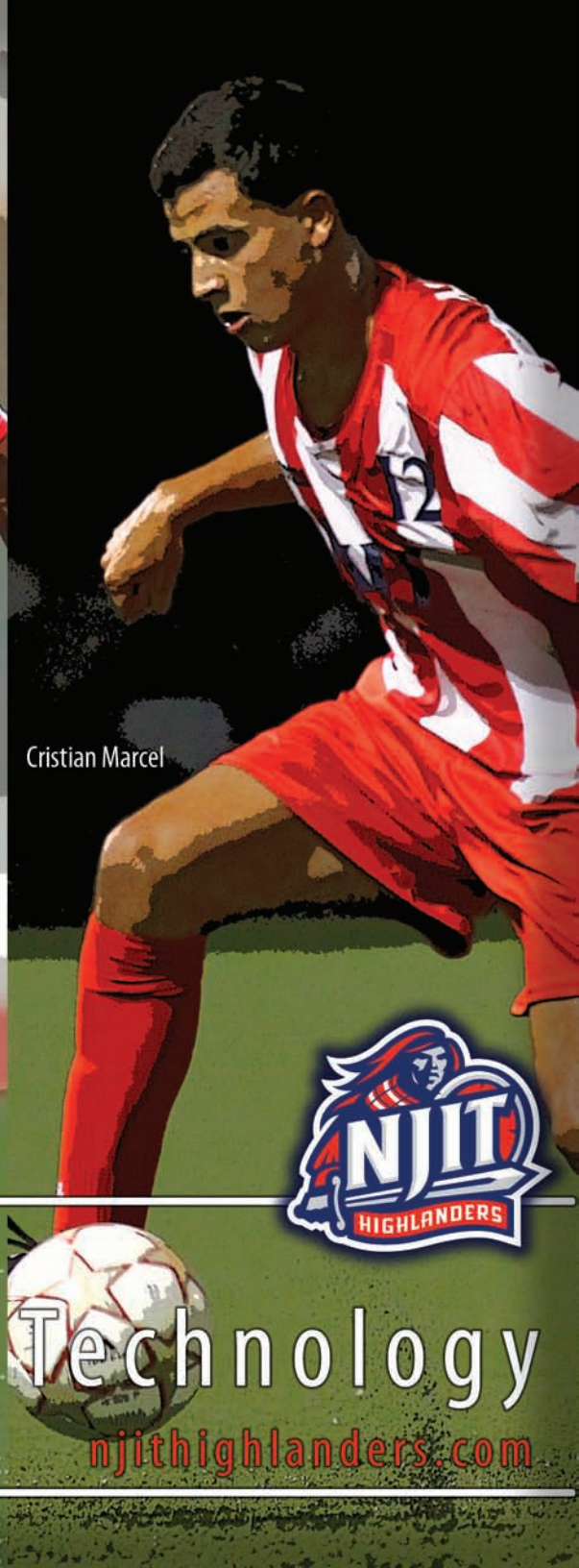

NJIT is New Jersey's Science & Technology University. With roots going back to 1881, when it was founded as Newark Technical School, New Jersey Institute of Technology observed its 125th anniversary in 2006.

Located in University Heights, Newark, NJ, home to more than 30,000 college students, NJIT's campus is just 10 miles from New York City.

Playing a critical role in shaping New Jersey's future, NJIT, as a major public technological university, is an important pipeline for the flow of technology into society. The university's educational programs prepare students to be leaders in the technology-dependent economy of the 21st century. University researchers seek new knowledge to improve processes and products for industry. Through public and private partnerships and economic development efforts, the university helps to grow new business ventures that fuel the economy.

In recent years, NJIT has put more than \$83 million toward new and improved buildings and facilities on the 45-acre campus, including biomedical engineering labs and a campus center.

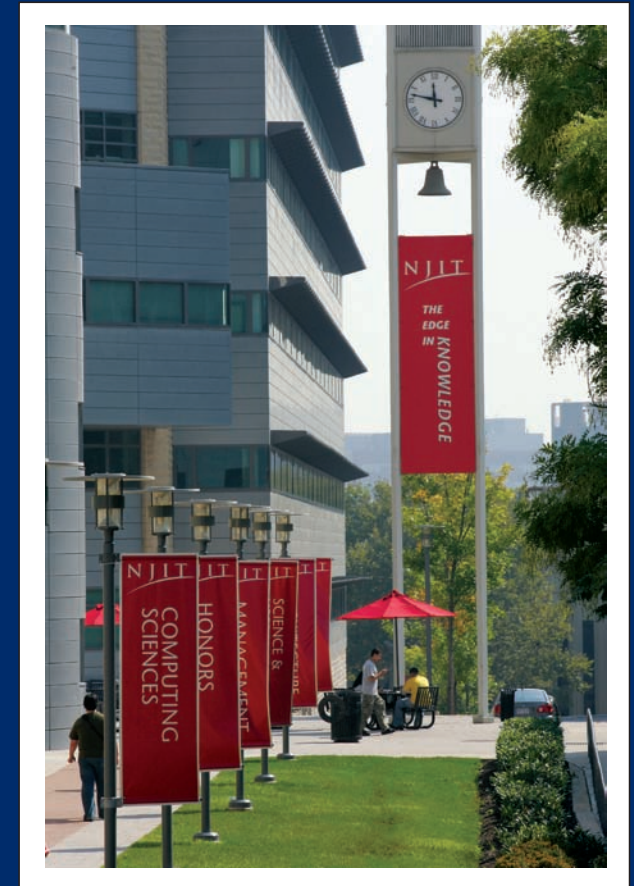
Instructional Programs

NJIT offers an ever-expanding array of educational programs, with eight new academic programs approved beginning in 2009-10, which comes after the addition of 14 new programs in 2008. As of 2009, NJIT lists 55 bachelor's degree majors, 53 master's degree programs and 19 doctoral programs — through six schools:

- Newark College of Engineering**
- College of Architecture and Design**
- College of Science and Liberal Arts**
- School of Management**
- Albert Dorman Honors College**
- College of Computing Sciences**

NJIT has 490 full-time faculty; more than 98 percent of whom hold the highest degree in their field. The student-faculty ratio is 16:1, with more than 7,125 undergraduate students and more than 2,825 graduate students. Our students hail from 33 states and more than 100 countries to rank eighth in the nation for diversity. Albert Dorman Honors College enrolls more than 500 students who take advantage of honors courses, research opportunities, advising and mentoring. Honors College students have SAT scores ranking in the top 10 percent nationally.

With more than 44,000 alumni, NJIT is rated by U.S. News and World Report as a top-tier research university offering bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees.



Research

NJIT's research expenditures totaled more than \$100 million in 2011. As of June 30, 2011, NJIT had 134 issued patents, of which 60 are licensed to third parties.

Strategic Initiatives

The University's 2010-2015 strategic plans identify several focal areas for growth and development in education of young people and professionals.

- Sustainable Systems, including sustainable design, environmental science and engineering, ecology and alternative energy technologies.
- Digital Everywhere, including wireless telecommunications, social networks and cloud computing, network security and financial bubble research.
- Life and Healthcare Science and Engineering, including tissue engineering and adult stem cell research, rehabilitation medicine, biomedical informatics and data mining, and drug development and pharmaceutical manufacturing techniques.

On-going projects designed to enhance campus life and increase residential students on campus by 600:

- Warren Street Village at NJIT, which includes the Dorman Residential Honors College, 6-story facility with residence floors to house 360 honors scholars, as well as a common area with studying and other facilities to be used by commuter and residential honors students alike, designed to increase academic and social collaboration among honors scholars. The complex will also house five duplex town houses for Greek organizations and will have a restaurant, convenience store and a fitness center.
- The Gateway Project, which will integrate development of an enhanced University Heights neighborhood, envisioned with such improved amenities as enhanced housing and new commercial space with shops and restaurants.



Economic Development

NJIT is committed to economic development for Newark and the region. The university operates several outreach centers that provide direct technical assistance to the state's businesses with the goal of helping small and medium-sized companies. NJIT is also the home of New Jersey's oldest and largest incubator facility, and was one of the first institutions in the nation to adopt economic development as a fourth mission element, together with instruction, research and community service. More than 60 technology start-up companies, many of which hire NJIT students, are on campus.

The Career Edge

All 10 of the majors with the highest starting salaries for 2005-06 grads are in engineering, computing and business, according to the National Association of Colleges and Employers.

Computer and data processing services lead the list of the 10 fastest-growing occupations in projections compiled by the U.S. Department of Labor. Computer-related employment is expected to grow 117 percent by 2008, according to the Career Guide to Industries.

As technology changes all fields, those with science and technology backgrounds are positioned to lead. Among the CEOs of the S&P 500 companies, engineering is the single largest undergraduate degree and more than half of CEOs have undergraduate degrees in engineering, business management, science, math and computing.

The Global Edge

The high level of diversity in NJIT's student body and faculty prepares graduates to understand and succeed in the global marketplace. U.S. News ranks NJIT 10th among national universities for campus diversity.

NJIT was named among the top 500 world universities in a study by the Institute of Higher Education, Shanghai Jiao Tong University. Institutions were judged on quality of education, quality of faculty, research output and size; only 170 US institutions were ranked in the top 500.

The Technology Edge

NJIT has been designated as one of the nation's most technologically sophisticated universities by Forbes.com and a Princeton Review survey and the university has received major funding from the National Science Foundation and the National Security Agency in recent years.

The Academic Edge

NJIT has long been a national leader in applying new technologies and approaches to the education experience. NJIT was a pioneer in requiring computer science for students in all majors and the School of Architecture has led innovations in teaching CAD and digital design. The School's innovative "paperless" first-year program was recently cited by Campus Technology Magazine.

Students have a wide range of educational choices in building an interest-tailored program. Among their options are cross-enrolling at neighboring Rutgers to enrich their program with subjects such as music and languages.

NJIT students learn emerging technologies from researchers behind the technologies, developing valuable marketplace skills. Real-world experience through experiential learning makes graduates more marketable, with many co-op opportunities leading to permanent jobs.

The Regional Edge

New Jersey, with America's highest concentration of pharmaceutical, hi-tech, biotech, and medical device companies, is the place to study technology. It has the nation's highest per capita number of engineers and scientists as residents, while also leading in per capita rate of patents issued. Further, the Newark-New York region is a living laboratory for architecture and building sciences, environmental engineering and transportation.





The Research Edge

NJIT has been designated by the State of New Jersey as the Homeland Security Technology Systems Center and NJIT operates the world-renowned Big Bear Solar Observatory.

A History of NJIT

From the Industrial Revolution to the Information Age, New Jersey Institute of Technology has a rich history with its beginnings developing from the industrial age.

In 1881, an act of the New Jersey State Legislature, recognizing an urgent need, sought a home for what would be the state's technical school. The efforts of Newark's public and private sectors resulted with the opening of Newark Technical School, addressing the state's need.

Over time, the university expanded its curriculum and mission. In 1919, the university established baccalaureate programs in three engineering fields. By the middle of the 20th century, Newark Technical School was transformed into the robust Newark College of Engineering.

The post-war period was one of enormous activity with regular expansion of the campus, as well as the introduction of doctoral level programs. In 1975, with the addition of the New Jersey School of Architecture, the institution had evolved into a technological university, emphasizing a broad range of degrees and dedication to significant research and public service. Newark College of Engineering, stronger than ever, remained intact, but a new university name — New Jersey Institute of Technology — reflected the institution's expanded mission.

A broadened mission called for the creation of a residential campus and the opening of NJIT's first dormitory in 1980 began a period of steady growth that continues. Two new schools were established during the 1980s—the College of Science and Liberal Arts (1982) and the School of Industrial Management (1988). The Albert Dorman Honors College was established in 1994, and the newest school, the College of Computing Sciences, was created in 2001. Beginning in 2009 the College of Architecture and Design was created to house the New Jersey School of Architecture and the new school of Art and Design.



Dr. Joel Bloom President

On January 9, 2012, the New Jersey Institute of Technology Board of Trustees voted unanimously to appoint Dr. Joel Bloom as President of the University, effective immediately.

Dr. Bloom, had been serving as Interim President of NJIT since September 28, 2011, following the resignation of the previous president, Robert A. Altenkirch, who had been in that post since July 2002.

Speaking for the NJIT Board of Trustees, Kathleen Wielkopolski said: “It is in the best interest of the university to appoint a president at the earliest possible date to provide stability and continuity to the important work of the university; that is, educating New Jersey’s future science and technology leaders, responding to opportunities presented by the governor for workforce and economic development, building NJIT’s national academic and research reputation, and proceeding with our ongoing significant fund raising initiatives, specifically, the \$150 million ‘NJIT NEXT’ campaign.”

Bloom, who is NJIT Vice President for Academic and Student Services, as well as founding dean of the Albert Dorman Honors College, is well-positioned to take on this leadership role. Bloom, with a career spanning 20 years at NJIT, is passionate about the university and its students as their education in the sciences, engineering, technology, design and management transforms their future and that of their families.

As Vice President for Academic and Student Services, Dr. Bloom is responsible for eight divisions of the university, including physical education and athletics. In that role, his guidance has been vital in NJIT’s transition in intercollegiate athletics to NCAA Division I from Division II, an endeavor that began in earnest following November 2002 discussions among Dr. Bloom, then-President Altenkirch, and Director of Athletics Lenny Kaplan. The transition reached official fruition on September 1, 2009, when the NCAA embraced NJIT as an across-the-board active (full) member of Division I following completion of a rigorous formal process.

Bloom’s impact on the university has been significant. Under his watch, student enrollment increased from 7,600 to over 9,500 students, including increases in female and minority students. The average SAT math score is now in the top quarter nationally; Dorman Honors College enrollment increased 70 percent, totaling 685 with combined average SAT scores over 1335 for fall 2011; articulation agreements are currently signed with the state’s high-tech high schools and 19 county colleges; and accelerated joint admission agreements exist with UMDNJ Medical and Dental Schools, St. George’s Medical School, SUNY College of Optometry and Seton Hall Law School.

In his role as dean of the Dorman Honors College and Vice President for Student and Academic Services, Bloom has been integral in helping to shape the academic plan for the university. Further, Bloom is leading the development of a Dorman Residential Honors College and the planning for a Greek Village in collaboration with Greek alumni and currently enrolled students. Previously, Bloom led the successful effort to raise \$23M for Dorman Honors College scholarships.

Bloom expanded the Center for Pre-College Programs to help prepare students for the rigors of science, mathematics, engineering and technology education; with the college deans and faculty, he expanded honors courses and undergraduate research, established the university’s medical and health committee of faculty to advise and assist undergraduate students entry into graduate and professional schools and to coordinate the health-related NJIT disciplines; he increased retention and graduation rates, and planned residence halls that transformed a commuter campus to one with more than 50 percent of the freshmen living on campus.

As the university proceeds to implement a major comprehensive fundraising campaign, “Dr. Bloom brings an understanding of the university, its history and contacts, and will provide the necessary continuity needed at this time,” said Trustee Wielkopolski.

Bloom has served the Newark community through his participation in the development of Science Park High School. He has also initiated multiple programs with the Newark Public Schools, most recently with the new Central High School—yielding the largest number of enrolled NJIT

freshmen from the school. For over a decade, he has served as vice chair of the board for Community and Schools, a national dropout prevention program serving Newark and other urban school districts. He is active in many education organizations including The NJ Presidents’ Council Executive Board for New Jersey Edgenet and the executive board of the NSF-funded Philadelphia Alliance for Minority Participation.

He has received national and state education awards, as well as federal, foundation and corporate grant awards. He has published journal articles and presented papers on school improvement, curriculum development, college transition and student assessment.

Prior to joining NJIT, Bloom served seven years as an assistant commissioner for the New Jersey Department of Education for the Division of General Academic Education. He was responsible for managing many of the education department’s initiatives during Governor Thomas Kean’s administration and was responsible for statewide assessment, curriculum standards, math/science/technology education, and the improvement of urban education through piloting the Effective Schools research and Alternative Education programs.

Formerly a teacher and school administrator in New York City Public Schools, Dr. Bloom was also a director of research and instructor at Teacher’s College, Columbia University.

He holds a master’s degree and a doctorate from Teacher’s College, Columbia University. He also earned master’s and bachelor’s degrees from Hunter College of the City University of New York.

Upon becoming Interim President, Dr. Bloom announced that Jack Gentul, Dean of Students, will serve as Interim Vice President for Academic and Student Services and that Distinguished Professor of Electrical and Computer Engineering, Atam Dhawan, currently the Associate Dean of the Albert Dorman Honors College, will become the Interim Dean.



Charles J. Fey
*Vice President for
Academic and Student
Services*

Dr. Charles J Fey, joined NJIT with 39 years of leadership experience in student services as the new NJIT Vice President of Academic and Student Support Service in September 2012.

Previously, he was Vice President for student engagement and success and a professor in the graduate school at the University of Akron where he managed a \$53 million divisional budget, a student affairs staff of 386 members, supervised three associate vice presidents, two assistant vice presidents plus fund-raised through gifts and grant-writing.

Fey’s four years at Akron followed a decade of service at the University of Maryland Baltimore Campus (UMBC), a research extensive university and member of the University System of Maryland. UMBC is best known for its undergraduate honors college. His last position was as vice president for student affairs. More than 20 years of student support service experiences at six other institutions of higher learning preceded this position.

His proudest recent achievement was the creation and management of the Akron Experience, a signature program designed to advance total student learning and engagement to help students make intellectual connections between in-class and out-of-class learning while insuring pathways of success.

While there, he also partnered with the Provost on projects to enhance the equality of student life and the student experience. These efforts resulted in the creation of living/learning communities which were so remarkable that they have received national recognition. The out of the classroom experiences created and implemented by members of his division resulted in Akron being named the “Campus of the Year” award from Campus Activities magazine.

At UMBC, three programs resulted in markedly higher retention and graduation rates--the latter from 54 to 61 percent. He partnered with the provost, faculty members and residence life staff to expand a successful residence hall faculty-mentoring

program and living learning and communities and oversaw the establishment of a learning community for commuter students.

Working with the Provost’s Office, he and a Vice Provost developed a first-year experience program featuring a traditional credit-bearing course which resulted in the establishment of an undergraduate education office.

Fey received his EdD in the administration of higher education from Texas A&M University. He received both his BA in liberal arts from Pennsylvania State University as well as his Master of Education in counselor/education/college student personal services. He did post master’s degree coursework in business management and higher education at Catholic University.



Lenny Kaplan
Director of Athletics

Since taking over as head of NJIT’s division of physical education and athletics in August 2000, Lenny Kaplan has been instrumental in guiding NJIT’s reclassification to NCAA Division I.

Kaplan helped stabilize and expand a program that was entering its fourth year in Division II when he arrived in Newark.

In late 2002, after discussions with university President Dr. Robert A. Altenkirch and Vice President Dr. Joel Bloom, Kaplan took on the task of steering NJIT’s programs into Division I, a process that reached fruition with the NCAA’s granting active Division I status, with full championship eligibility effective September 1, 2009.

Throughout Kaplan’s tenure, NJIT has enhanced the athletics program, particularly in areas that benefit the student-athletes directly.

The sports offerings have expanded to the current 18 varsity programs. And since 2004, NJIT has renovated its two main on-campus venues—Lubetkin Field at J. Malcolm Simon Stadium at Lubetkin Field and the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center. Further, the Naimoli Family Recreation Center, a 25,600-square foot facility opened early in 2011 enhanced the recreational and intercollegiate opportunities on campus.

The school also signed a 10-year partnership to play all home baseball in the professional Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium

and later agreed to host basketball in the new Prudential Center, downtown Newark home of the NHL’s New Jersey Devils.

Under Kaplan’s leadership, many teams achieved regional and national Division II ranking. Success for several women’s teams was unprecedented, with basketball, tennis and soccer all reaching postseason play for the first time in his administration,

Additionally, men’s volleyball captured a 2007 divisional championship in the Eastern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association and the next year reached the EIVA playoff semifinals hosted by eventual 2008 national champion Penn State.

Kaplan guided the Highlanders toward further stability with membership in the newly-expanded all-sports Great West Conference, which offers a conference home for 11 of NJIT’s varsity sports.

In 2009-10, NJIT’s first year as a full active member of Division I, the women’s volleyball team and senior Sabrina Baby became the school’s first national statistical champions at the Division I level, as team and individual leaders, respectively, digs per set. Baby was honored as the school’s first CoSIDA Academic All-America in the Division I era, earning third-team national honors.

Christian Baumbach, a sophomore at the time, made history in 2009 as NJIT’s first individual conference champion at the Division I level, when he won the Great West Conference men’s cross country race. He also won the prestigious IC4A University Division race in the 101st annual running of that contest.

In 2010-11, the Highlanders earned their first-ever Division I conference team championship when women’s tennis captured the Great West title in May.

NJIT’s outstanding home facilities will allow it to host conference championships in the Great West Conference and allowed it to host ECAC postseason championships in 2005-06.

Before coming to NJIT, Lenny Kaplan served 11 years at Manhattan College, where he began as Manhattan’s director of operations and was assistant athletics director from 1991-2000.

Kaplan, a 1988 graduate of St. John’s University with a degree in athletics administration, resides in Merrick, NY, with his wife, Nancy, and their sons, Michael and Joshua.

Sports Medicine

NJIT sports medicine is moving forward with expanded facilities and a staff of three full-time trainers led by head trainer Matt Koscs, MS/ATC, with assistant trainers Paul Grayner, MEd/ATC, and Sandra Brendle, MEd/ATC. They work with team physicians Louis Rizio, MD, and Stephen Matta, DO.

Matt Koscs, who earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Delaware, has served NJIT as head trainer since July 2009, a year after he joined the staff as an assistant trainer. As an undergrad at Delaware, he was recipient of the Paris Delligatti Memorial Award for Excellence in Athletic Training.

Prior to NJIT, he served three years as head trainer at Hodgson Vocational Technical High School in Newark, DE. He also worked with soccer clubs in Delaware and was employed at Christiana Care Physical Therapy Plus, in Newark, DE.

Paul Grayner, who holds a bachelor's degree from Saint Leo College in Florida and a master's from American University in Washington, DC, has a diverse background in athletic training, having served at the college and professional levels, as well as in a fitness center setting. He joined the NJIT staff late in 2008.

From the mid-1970s to the mid-1980s, he was a trainer in the minor league systems of the New York Yankees and New York Mets and in 1984 he was assistant trainer with the Mets. He later worked with the Long Island Knights professional basketball team.

At the collegiate level, he was head trainer at Fairleigh Dickinson University in Teaneck, NJ from 1989 to 1998 and earlier worked as an assistant trainer at Hofstra, Adelphi and FDU.

Brittany Vorndran, who joined the NJIT staff as an assistant athletic trainer in the summer of 2012, earned her bachelor's degree, majoring in athletic training, from Bridgewater (MA) State College in 2010 and was the school's 2008-09 Athletic Training Student of the Year.

She earned her master's in Kinesiology at James Madison University in Harrisonburg, VA, in May 2012. At James Madison, she worked with the cross country, track and field, tennis and cheerleading teams.

A resident of Millville, NJ, she has worked as a substitute teacher for the Millville Board of Education

Dr. Louis Rizio is a board certified orthopedic surgeon and is fellowship trained in the field of sports medicine. He is a graduate of Rutgers and after earning his medical degree from the UMDNJ/New Jersey Medical School, Dr. Rizio completed his orthopedic residency at Tufts University in Boston.

He then completed a sports medicine fellowship at the University of Miami and was assistant team physician of the Hurricanes, as well as the Miami Dolphins, the Miami Hurricanes.

Dr. Rizio practices at the New Jersey Sports Medicine Institute in Livingston, NJ. Prior to starting his own practice, Dr Rizio was the Chief of Sports Medicine at the NJ Medical School from 2000-2005. He is affiliated with four New Jersey hospitals: St. Barnabas Medical Center (Livingston); Short Hills Medical Center (Short Hills); Mountainside Hospital (Montclair); and, Overlook Hospital (Summit).

Dr. Stephen Matta, who is board certified in family medicine, currently specializes in primary care sports medicine at Mountainside Hospital in Montclair, NJ, a post he assumed after three years in the family practice residency program at Valley Baptist Medical Center in Harlingen, TX. He is a 2007 graduate of a five-year DO/MBA dual degree program with Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine for his medical degree and Saint Joseph's University for an

MBA in healthcare administration. He is a 2002 magna cum laude graduate of Duquesne University in Pittsburgh, with a BS in honors chemistry. He and his family reside in Belleville, NJ.

Strength and Conditioning

Strength and conditioning is a key part of a successful Division I program, with an eye toward maximizing individual and team performance in competition. The strength and conditioning coach also works closely with the Athletic Training Staff in the areas of injury prevention and injury rehabilitation.

The 2008-09 year brought another dimension to NJIT athletics with the hiring of *Dan Huff*, CSCS, as the program's first full-time strength and conditioning coach. In addition to the hiring of a full-time coach to coordinate the strength and conditioning, NJIT renovated the weight rooms and purchased new equipment, with the area dedicated to use by the Highlander teams.

Huff previously served five years as strength and conditioning coordinator at Fairleigh Dickinson University in Teaneck, NJ, from 2003 to 2008, working with an 18-sport NCAA Division I program.

Huff was Sports Performance Director for Velocity Sports Performance in Wall, NJ, immediately before accepting his position at NJIT. He is a graduate of William Paterson University of New Jersey. He holds numerous certifications.

Academic Enrichment

NJIT's Center for Academic and Personal Enrichment (CAPE) added a new component in 2007 with the addition of an Associate Director position that was created for the specific purpose of serving the needs of NJIT's student-athletes.

The position focuses on five key areas: academic support, career development, personal development, leadership and community service including the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and CHAMPS Life Skills for NJIT's nearly 300 student-athletes.

Sandra Taylor filled the post in January 2010, having previously spent her professional career at Manhattan College, which is also her alma mater.

Working at Manhattan, a founding member of the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference, Taylor was most recently Associate Director of Athletics and Senior Woman Administrator, filling those posts from 1996 to 2010.

For much of that time (1995-2003), she was Chief Athletic Department Compliance Officer. She began her service at Manhattan as Athletic Department Ticket Manager, serving in that capacity from 1993 to 2003.

She served on numerous NCAA, conference and internal college committees, including service on the NCAA Division I Management Council from 2004 to 2007 and as chair of the NCAA Women's Lacrosse Committee from 2002 to 2006.

She earned both her bachelor's degree in secondary education and her master's degree in special education from Manhattan College and is a doctoral candidate in educational leadership at St. Mary's University in Winona, MN.

Sandra and her husband, Ken, who is Associate Commissioner for Men's Basketball and Baseball at the MAAC, reside in Monroe Township, NJ, with their daughters, Katherine, who was born in May 2004, and Samantha, who was born in July 2009.

New to the staff in 2011-12 is *Elizabeth Bookwalter*, the eligibility certification officer/academic advisor, who brings a wealth of experience to her post at NJIT.

Most recently before coming to NJIT, she worked from March 2009 to 2011 in the NCAA Eligibility Center as Associate Director of Client Relations/Coordinator of Customer Service.

She is a journalism graduate of The Ohio State University and she earned her master's degree from the University of Tennessee with a concentration in sport management.

At Ohio State, she was a student intern in the Athletic Communications Office and she was a graduate assistant for compliance at Tennessee, while also working as a project leader/project assistant for the legal firm Vorys, Sater, Seymour and Pease, LLP.

She began full-time work in NCAA compliance at American University in Washington, DC, in 2006, before joining the compliance office at Florida State University, where she served from September 2006 to March 2009.

NJIT's Center for Academic and Personal Enrichment, headed by Dr. Marybeth Boger, is a resource available to all students within NJIT's Student Services Division. The CAPE provides academic support services and activities to enhance students' academic and professional development and it works with academic and administrative departments to help students develop the necessary analytical and problem-solving skills to become independent learners.

CAPE provides tutoring, student success workshops and testing accommodations.

ATHLETICS SENIOR STAFF

Beginning on September 1, 2009, the entire NJIT athletics program officially gained across-the-board active membership in NCAA Division I, completing a process that began officially in 2003.

NJIT, its teams, and student-athletes enjoy the full benefits of Division I membership, including eligibility for Division I postseason championship competition and the inclusion of the Highlanders among the national Division I leaders in statistics maintained by the NCAA.

Within months of NJIT's active Division I membership, the school won its first national Division I statistical championships, as women's volleyball player Sabrina Baby led the nation in digs per set, while she and her teammates captured the team digs crown for digs, as well.

The NCAA's decision making NJIT a full member of Division I completed a specific timetable that required NJIT and its Department of Athletics to meet a series of annual benchmarks before proceeding to the next step.

NJIT, which previously competed in NCAA Division II, first moved to reclassify its men's soccer program in 2003. The move grew out of November 2002 meetings among President Robert A. Altenkirch, Vice President Joel Bloom, and Director of Athletics Lenny Kaplan. From there, came a proposal from Dr. Altenkirch to the Board of Trustees, which unanimously approved in February 2003 a plan to reclassify men's soccer to Division I. Little more than two years later, the NCAA approved NJIT's proposal to begin advancing its entire program to Division I.

Men's soccer achieved active Division I status in 2005 and NJIT women's soccer became postseason-eligible in 2007. The remainder of NJIT's athletics program also began reclassifying in 2005, with active status taking longer for an entire program than under the single-sport-per-gender track used for the two soccer teams.

In 2005-06 the lion's share of the competition for all but men's soccer came at the Division II level. In 2006-07, 2007-08, and 2008-09, NJIT's teams competed at the Division I level and complied full with NCAA Division I rules, but were not eligible for championships at the top level.

Every facet of the program has been enhanced in the reclassification, with a special emphasis placed on student-athlete welfare. Facility upgrades have gone along with sports medicine staff expansion, a strength and conditioning program, and academic enrichment. NJIT has also built a model NCAA Division I rules

compliance regimen within its athletics program and across the entire university.

A key late benchmark in reclassification came in the spring of 2009, with NJIT's successful completion of the NCAA Division I certification self-study. An in-depth project that takes approximately one year to complete and involves an on-campus visit from a Peer Review team, Division I certification, renewable every 10 years, is required of all active Division I institutions.

"We completed a major milestone in demonstrating that we have the infrastructure in place and the commitment to compete at the highest levels, not only academically but now athletically as well," said Dr. Altenkirch, who made upgrading athletics a priority from the beginning

of his tenure as the seventh President of NJIT in May 2002.

Professor Robert English, the NCAA Faculty Athletics Representative and Interim Dean of the School of Management, added, “I am very impressed with NJIT’s student-athletes who have worked hard to meet the challenge of the heightened level of Division I competition and at the same time continued to excel academically, with many athletes earning academic honors and awards and several earning perfect 4.0 GPAs during the semester of competition.”

Further, the NJIT Board of Trustees embraced the transition to Division I as part of the university’s strategic plan to enhance the quality of campus life in NJIT’s transition to a residential university.

Going back to early announcements of NJIT’s NCAA reclassification plans, Altenkirch stated: “As NJIT continues to grow academically, and as a residential university, strengthening the athletics program through the transition to Division I will allow us to align the university with our academic peers.”

Already, NJIT’s teams have competed throughout the United States, taking on opponents from schools that are instantly recognizable for their stature in academics and athletics.

NJIT teams and student-athletes have faced opponents from seven of the eight Ivy League schools (all except for Brown, which will be the opening opponent for Highlander women’s basketball in 2011-12) and all eight Patriot League schools, including Army and Navy, Bucknell, Lafayette, and Lehigh.

In addition, Highlander teams have taken on squads from such famed conferences as the Atlantic Coast Conference, Big East Conference, Big Ten Conference, Big 12 Conference, and Pac 10 Conference.

Two high-profile opponents--Maryland in men’s soccer in 2005 and Penn State in men’s volleyball in 2008—won national championships following the same regular seasons in which they faced NJIT.

The Highlanders have also competed against members of all of the conferences based in the Northeastern and Mid-Atlantic regions of the United States, including

America East, Atlantic 10, Colonial, Metro Atlantic, Mid-Eastern, and Northeast.

The eighth New Jersey-based institution in Division I, NJIT has competed against all seven of its home state peers, including Big East programs Rutgers and Seton Hall.

NJIT’s longest-established Division I program, men’s soccer, gained its first win against a Big East foe in 2008, defeating Rutgers a year after topping San Diego State for the Highlanders’ first win over a Top 25-ranked team.

NJIT began play as a core member of its first Division I conference, the Great West Conference, which began full competition in 2009-10. In the spring of 2011, the second season for the GWC, the Highlanders celebrated their first Division I team championship, when women’s tennis captured the Great West title.

With its place in Division I officially certified by the NCAA, NJIT looks ahead to continued growth. That outlook is consistent with President Altenkirch’s frequently expressed view that, “the transition to Division I is just that, a transition, a process rather than an event.”

For his part, Director of Athletics Lenny Kaplan said: “We are looking forward to being a solid and successful member of Division I and we are excited by the opportunity to write a new chapter in the history of NJIT athletics.”

The New Jersey Institute of Technology teams play home games and practice in a combination of facilities on campus and off.

The on-campus facilities include Lubetkin Field at J. Malcolm Simon Stadium for outdoor sports and the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center for indoor sports. In addition, NJIT in 2011 opened is the Naimoli Family Athletic and Recreational Facility, a multi-purpose indoor facility on the site of the former outdoor tennis courts.

Off-campus venues include Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, a professional minor league stadium that is the home of NJIT baseball; the Prudential Center, home of the NHL Devils and NBA Nets, which has hosted selected NJIT basketball games; and, Branch Brook Park in Newark and Van Cortlandt Park in the Bronx, home sites for NJIT cross country. All except for Van Cortlandt Park are less than two miles from the NJIT campus.

Lubetkin Field at J. Malcolm Simon Stadium

The men's and women's soccer teams play their home games and practice on campus at Lubetkin Field at J. Malcolm Simon Stadium, a first-class venue for college soccer.

The field on the west end of NJIT's University Heights campus is an all-weather facility, with 24/7 availability for competition or practice. Outfitted with SprinTurf artificial grass in the summer of 2004, Lubetkin Field at J. Malcolm Simon Stadium also includes lighting for night contests, bleacher seating for more than 1,000 spectators, a press box and scoreboard.

The fully-enclosed facility, with its entrance a few feet opposite the entrance of the indoor Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center, can take its place alongside any college soccer facility in the Northeast.

The home of Highlanders soccer served as the host site for the first-ever Great West Conference women's soccer championship tournament in November 2009. Previously, NJIT hosted the three-day 2005 ECAC Division II women's soccer championship tournament.

In the fall of 2005, when the Northeast was hit with record rainfall, games went on without a hitch at Lubetkin Field, thanks to the quality of the surface. Indeed, with the rain disrupting schedules around the region, some crucial Big East contests involving Seton Hall were moved to NJIT's home field. Those games, too, went off without a hitch.

Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center

The NJIT men's and women's basketball teams and men's and women's volleyball teams play their home games in the Fleisher Athletic Center gymnasium, while the swimming team competes and practices in building's pool. The Fleisher Center also houses intercollegiate fencing, as well as all athletic department offices, varsity and general weight and fitness rooms, and the athletic training room.

In the summer of 2006, the gym underwent renovation to include installation of a new floor and baskets, new lighting, new sound system and new scoreboards, along with entirely new seating for approximately 1,500 spectators after the first phase of renovation. The back bay 'C gym' can be sectioned off from the main competition floor, making the facility useful for intramurals, physical education classes and campus recreation time, while being able to host multiple simultaneous events.

A six-lane swimming pool in Fleisher Athletic Center is home to the NJIT swimming team. Fencing has its own area on the second floor of the building.

In addition to all athletic department offices, the Fleisher Athletic Center also houses the sports medicine staff in the Athletic Training Room and the varsity weight room, supervised by the head strength and condition coach. The building's third floor is home to a fitness center, which is open for use by all students and staff.

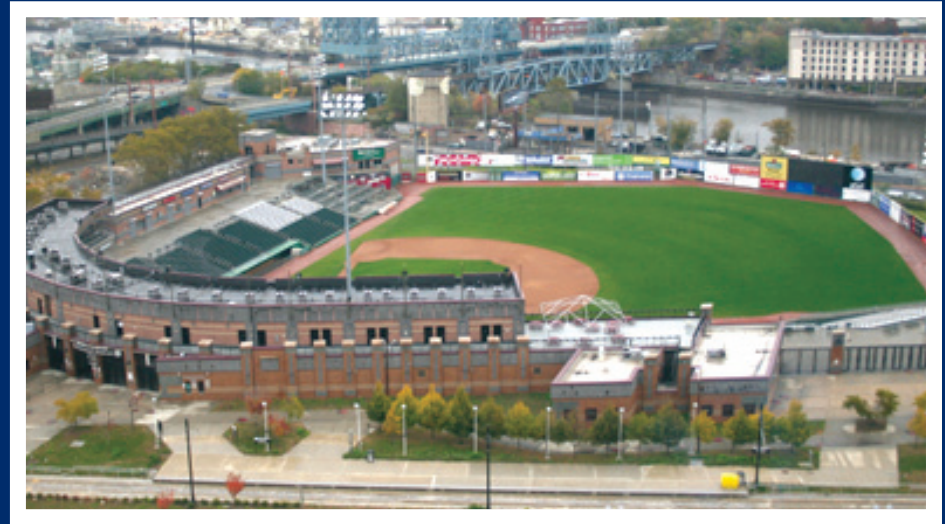
The Naimoli Family Athletic & Recreation Facility

Opened in 2011, the facility is approximately 25,600 square feet. The Naimoli Family Center will be a multi-purpose space for athletics, community recreation, and gatherings involving large numbers of people.

Built on top of the old outdoor tennis courts adjoining the Fleisher Athletic Center, construction of this new building has been made possible, in part, by a generous gift from Vincent Naimoli '62, Chairman and CEO of Anchor

Industries International and Chairman Emeritus/Founder of the Tampa Bay Rays major league baseball team.

The facility houses courts for tennis and is available for other athletic and recreational activities, including practice for basketball and volleyball. It is heated and air conditioned, with flooring appropriate for the intended athletics and recreational activities.

Its indoor tennis courts offer vital year round practice and playing opportunities for NJIT's intercollegiate tennis teams, which have been consistently successful in the transition to Division I. In 2011, the women's tennis team became NJIT's first conference championship team in the Division I era.

Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium: Home of the NJIT Highlanders

Joe Torre, then the manager of the New York Yankees, visited New Jersey Institute of Technology on December 8, 2005 to herald a new partnership between NJIT's baseball team, the Highlanders, and the Newark Bears.

Torre, a friend of the Bears and of college baseball, was on hand as the Highlanders signed a 10-year contract to play their home games at Bears & Eagles Riverfront Stadium in Newark.

"I think this partnership is nothing but aces," Torre said during a press conference at NJIT. "It's a partnership between two class organizations that will make for nothing but a lot of fun for everyone."

For the previous two years, the Highlanders played their home games at the stadium. But the team's longer-term commitment to play at the stadium came as NJIT elevated its baseball program to Division I.

"NJIT is bringing Division I baseball to this great stadium," said NJIT President Robert A. Altenkirch, "which will generate the highest level of excitement. It's a great partnership that allows NJIT to play intercollegiate baseball in a great facility, maybe the best for college baseball in the country."

Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, the \$30 million state-of-the-art home of the Newark Bears, officially opened to the public on July 16, 1999.

With a seating capacity of 6,200 Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium affords everyone in attendance an up-close view of the action. The ballpark also has 20 luxury suites, a picnic area, a party deck, a concert stage situated behind the outfield wall and a major league-caliber press box featuring two radio booths and two television booths.

The name, Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, honors Newark's rich baseball history. The original Bears were a farm team for the New York Yankees up until 1949 and the Eagles were a very successful Negro League team that played in Newark until 1950.



Prudential Center

In October 2007, the Prudential Center ushered in a new era in sports and entertainment in Newark and the entire northern New Jersey area.

Prudential Center is the cornerstone in the revitalization and renaissance of downtown Newark. In addition to the arena, Newark will soon add scores of condominiums, restaurants, themed bars and mixed retail establishments. Prudential Center, one of the finest arenas in the country, is New Jersey's home for hockey, basketball, concerts and numerous other events.

A public/private partnership between the City of Newark and Devils Arena Entertainment made the \$375 million Prudential Center a reality that is changing the face of downtown Newark and making it a destination place for sports and live entertainment in the region.

“The Rock” is located about a mile from NJIT’s University Heights campus and is known best as the home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils and the former home of the National Basketball Association New Jersey Nets.

The arrival of the spectacular Prudential Center nearly coincided with NJIT’s arrival as an NCAA Division I institution--the first in Newark and the newest in New Jersey in more than 20 years. The Rock opened one year after NJIT began Division I competition as part of its NCAA reclassification which is now complete.

In the arena’s inaugural year, NJIT played host to six basketball games on four dates, including four men’s basketball games and two women’s games. Included was the first women’s basketball game in the building’s history, when the Highlanders entertained Cornell on January 15, 2008.

The Highlanders hosted additional basketball games in subsequent years and have played there each year of the building’s existence. Further, NJIT’s club ice hockey team plays all of its home games

in the full-size Devils practice rink facility (AmeriHealth Pavilion), which adjoins the main arena and has an 800-seat capacity. And one of the special events held in the main arena is NJIT’s annual commencement.

Branch Brook Park and Van Cortlandt Park

A hallmark of the NJIT cross country program under veteran coach Al Alonso is its ability to host cross country competition that have made Highlander-sponsored races a popular destination for schools from throughout the New York/New Jersey area.

In 2009, NJIT hosted the Great West Conference championships at Van Cortlandt Park in the Bronx, and the course, which is home to some of the most prestigious events in the sport, is also the home venue for other annual NJIT-hosted races. Branch Brook Park, which is a public park of Essex County, reaches into several towns, including Newark, with the park entrance less than a mile from the NJIT campus.

Newark: The Renaissance City

NJIT is located in the heart of New Jersey's largest city, Newark, with a population of over 300,000, making it the 65th-largest city in the United States. A major urban center, Newark is a city on the move.

Newark: New Jersey's College Town

Some 30,000 undergraduate, graduate, and professional students attend classes in the University Heights section, which is home to NJIT, Rutgers-Newark, the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey (UMDNJ), and Essex County College.

Adjacent to NJIT to the east, is the Newark campus of Rutgers University and the two schools enjoy an exceptionally close and productive relationship. NJIT and Rutgers students have library privileges at both campuses. NJIT students may also enrich their educational experience by enrolling in Rutgers-Newark courses and in full degree programs in disciplines not offered by NJIT, such as art, music, geology, and psychology.

Each year, the two universities co-sponsor a common season of theatrical productions, as well as 'World Week,' a joint program of honors colloquia, and a variety of other cultural and social activities.

NJIT also enjoys a cooperative relationship with its neighbor to the west in the University Heights area, UMDNJ, with several joint degree programs.

New Jersey/New York Metropolitan Region

NJIT and Newark are a part of a region that is a magnet not only to the rest of the United States, but also to the world.

In Newark and neighboring northern New Jersey alone, attractions such as the Prudential Center, New Jersey Performing Arts Center, Meadowlands Sports Complex, Red Bull Arena, Liberty Science Center, and numerous others are minutes away by car and in most cases accessible by public transportation. Literally dozens of shopping malls are within a 20-minute drive of Newark, as well.

Midtown Manhattan, with all that it and the rest of New York City offer, is less than 15 miles from the NJIT campus.

NJIT students have regular access to discount tickets for Broadway shows, museums, concerts, and sporting events.

The school also sponsors weekend trips throughout the northeastern United States, with activities such as skiing, boating, swimming, hiking, and more.

The spectacular Jersey shore is less than an hour away by car and winter sports are within a couple of hours drive to the west and north.

NJIT, with its campus in Newark, NJ, sits in a region that abounds with major professional sports unlike any other in the United States and perhaps in the world. There are nine teams in the major professional leagues (MLB, NFL, NBA, and NHL) located in New York City, northern New Jersey and Long Island.

Only one of nine major teams is more than 25 miles from Newark, but most, including the New Meadowlands Stadium (Giants and Jets NFL football), Madison Square Garden (NBA Knicks, NHL Rangers), are much closer.

The three closest professional sports venues (listed below) are within three miles of NJIT's campus and can be accessed in a matter of minutes at low cost by public transportation, beginning with Newark Light Rail, from campus.

Prudential Center

The home of the National Hockey League New Jersey Devils and the New Jersey Nets of the National Basketball Association is in downtown Newark at the corner of Mulberry and Edison streets, about one mile from the NJIT's University Heights campus.

Opened in October 2007, 'The Rock' is the centerpiece of the city's Downtown Core Redevelopment Project. In addition to NHL hockey and NBA basketball, it has hosted numerous entertainment and sporting events, including NJIT basketball.

NJIT played basketball in the Rock in the inaugural year and in each year since. Indeed, NJIT hosted the first women's basketball game ever played in the Prudential Center on January 15, 2008 (NJIT vs. Cornell).

The arena, with full-capacity seating for 18,500 spectators, features a 4,800 square-foot exterior LED screen, as well as the latest in ice-surface technology and a gourmet restaurant overlooking the ice for Devils games. The building contains 850,000 square feet of space, 9,000 tons of steel, eight million pounds of structural steel and 25,000 cubic yards of concrete.





Red Bull Arena

Located in Harrison, NJ, just across the Passaic River from Newark and less than three miles from the NJIT campus, the new home of the New York Red Bulls (opened in March 2010) sets the standard for soccer venues across North America.

The state-of-the-art soccer-specific facility is a major component of a multi-billion dollar development.

Red Bull Arena has a number of key design elements which give its seating bowl a close-to-the-action feeling and the unique stadium roof design extends from its leading edge over the entire seating bowl and then curve down to the concourse.

The overall seating capacity for soccer is 25,000, including 30 luxury suites (20 lower level and 10 upper level) and 1,116 club seats. Other amenities include three stadium clubs and two retail outlets.



Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium

Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium, the \$30 million state-of-the-art home of the professional baseball Newark Bears and since 2004 the home of NJIT Highlanders baseball, officially opened to the public on July 16, 1999. With a seating capacity of 6,200, "The Den" affords fans an up-close view of the action. The ballpark also has 20 luxury suites, a picnic area, a party deck, a concert stage situated behind the outfield wall and a major league-caliber press box.

In December 2005, NJIT and the Bears held a joint press conference to herald a new partnership that includes a 10-year deal that extends Bears and Eagles Riverfront Stadium as the home of NJIT Highlanders baseball.



COACHING STAFF

HEAD COACH CESAR MARKOVIC



Cesar Markovic, who, since 2003, has led programs at two schools into the NCAA Division I College Cup, was named the new head men's soccer coach at NJIT, in 2011.

Markovic, whose 15-year career record at three colleges is 151-125-34, has reached the Division

I tournament three times, beginning in 2003, when he led Saint Peter's to its first-ever NCAA bid in soccer. Moving on to Stony Brook in 2004, he led the Seawolves to their first-ever NCAA men's soccer bid in 2005 and returned to the College Cup field in 2009.

He completed his seven seasons at Stony Brook in 2010, posting a 10-7-3 overall record in his final campaign.

In announcing that Markovic will lead the Highlanders, Kaplan said: "We are ecstatic that Cesar is joining the NJIT athletics family. It says great things about NJIT as an institution and about the potential of Highlander soccer for us to attract a coach with his great track record. He is the ideal person to lead us to new success as a Division I program, while restoring a rich soccer tradition that

goes back to before 1960, when Newark College of Engineering (NJIT's institutional name at the time) won the NAIA National Championship."

Markovic is ready for the latest challenge in a career of building championship teams. "I am extremely excited about this opportunity", he said. "From the start of this process, NJIT has shown a strong commitment to taking this soccer program to the next level in Division I.

"While I am very happy to be here, I also feel a responsibility to create a tremendous soccer environment on campus and a culture of winning and exciting soccer at NJIT. I would like to thank AD Lenny Kaplan, President Robert Altenkirch, Vice President Dr. Joel Bloom and all of the Athletic Administration for bringing my family and me to this wonderful campus. I am honored to be the NJIT men's soccer coach and look forward to great times ahead."

In its first season under Markovic, NJIT tied its program record for wins in a season at the Division I level (began DI competition in 2004 and went 5-14-1 in 2009). The Highlanders finished with a 5-12-2 record in 2011.

NJIT also had a three-game winning streak (October 2 to 11; longest streak for NJIT in its Division I era); and, had a winning record at home (3-2-2, including a five-game unbeaten streak—two ties and then the three straight wins).

His Saint Peter's team in 2003 and his Stony Brook team in 2005 each won their first round NCAA games. Unranked Saint Peter's defeated Brown,

ranked 11th in the nation, and that win remains the only NCAA Tournament win for Saint Peter's in any sport. The 2005 Stony Brook team won its first round NCAA game against Yale for the Seawolves' first NCAA win in any sport.

He began his NCAA coaching career in 1995 at Division III Hunter, where he had been a star player. In five years as coach at the New York City school, he won the conference title every year and led the Hawks to the NCAA Division III Regional semifinals in 1999.

Moving to Division I in 2000 at Saint Peter's, he took over a program that had gone 10 seasons without a winning record and in his fourth year (2003) led the team to a school-record 18 wins, the program's first Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference championship and the NCAA bid.

Taking over a Stony Brook program that had finished last in the America East Conference the year before he was hired, he led the Long Island-based Seawolves to a school-record 13 wins and their first NCAA bid in his second season (2005).

With NJIT, he succeeds Pedro Lopes, who coached eight seasons at NJIT, finishing with a 4-13-1 record in 2010. Lopes led the Highlanders' transition to Division I from Division II, heading the final season Division II competition in 2003 and then all seven seasons of Division I competition to date.

Markovic's tenure at Stony Brook included three of the five 10-win seasons in school history. His record with the Seawolves was 58-59-22 overall and 24-20-10 in America East regular season play.

COACHING STAFF



Before Stony Brook, Markovic took over at Saint Peter's, where the program that had gone 14 years without a 10-win season and had gone 10 seasons without a winning record. His first two years with the Peacocks resulted in a combined mark of 7-29-1. But the next two saw a near-reversal to 28-11-3.

In his third season (2002), Saint Peter's was 10-6-3 and that proved to merely be the beginning, as 2003 brought the MAAC championship, a school-record 18 wins and the school's first-ever NCAA Tournament bid in soccer.

Markovic, who had a playing career that would earn him a spot in the Hunter College Hall of Fame, directed his alma mater's team from 1995 to 1999. In five seasons, his teams captured the conference championship every year. They won five regular season City University of New York regular season crowns and three CUNY postseason titles. In 1999, his final year at Hunter, the Hawks reached the NCAA Division III regional semifinals.

He brings four conference Coach of the Year awards with him to NJIT, having been CUNYAC Coach of the Year twice and Skyline Conference Coach of the Year once with Hunter and MAAC Coach of the Year in 2003 with Saint Peter's. He was BigAppleSoccer.com Coach of the Year for 2005 with Stony Brook.

A native of Queens, NY, Markovic earned his bachelor's degree from Hunter and his master's degree from Hofstra University. He lives with his wife, Tijana, and their two young children,

son Nikola (2 1/2), and daughter Viktorija (7 months), and he has two sons, Danilo (15) and Alessandro (12).

He has extensive club coaching experience and also coached Queensborough Community College in New York, as well as St. John's Prep, which he led to Catholic High Schools City and Sectional titles in 1993.

Markovic holds a USSF A License, the highest granted in USA Soccer, an NSCAA Premier License, and he was among the first American coaches granted a Brazilian Professional Coaching license after serving as an apprentice/assistant with the famed Sao Paulo FC. He also served as an assistant coach stateside with the professional Long Island Rough Riders in 1997 and 1998.

He has coached numerous all-region and all-conference players at the Division I level and nine of his former players have gone on to sign professional contracts.

He will aim to revive a rich Highlanders soccer tradition that existed for decades in the small college ranks, when the program was a regional power and rose up to national prominence, capped by winning the 1960 NAIA National Championship.





COACHING STAFF

ASSISTANT COACH DIDIER ORELLANA



Didier Orellana was head coach at Division III Manhattanville, guiding the Valiants for six seasons from 2005 through 2010. His 56 career wins are the most in school history and he produced a 13-5-1 record in 2009, earning Freedom Conference Coach of the Year honors. He followed in 2010 with a 10-6-1 mark. Ciano was

Orellana's assistant coach those two seasons.

Before becoming head coach at Manhattanville in Westchester County, Orellana was assistant coach at Division II New York Institute of Technology. Coaching there from 2001 to 2005, Orellana took part in NYIT's advancement from a 3-14 record in 2000 to a 14-2-2 record in 2003, which culminated with a trip to the NCAA Division II postseason tournament.

In addition to college, he has coached top developmental teams in New York, including with the Gottschee Soccer Club in Queens and continuing with the New York Cosmos U15 Pre-Academy program.

Orellana earned his undergraduate degree from Southern Connecticut State University and his master's degree from Queens (NY) College. In addition to coaching, he was a teacher at the intermediate school and high school levels from 1998 to 2005 in Queens and he also taught as a foreign language adjunct at Manhattanville College.

Playing at Southern Connecticut, one of the nation's top Division II programs, Orellana was on the Owls' 1995 National Champions. Southern reached the national semifinals in each of his other three seasons (1994, 1996, and 1997).

ASSISTANT COACH JOHN CIANO



John Ciano, who was a Division I goalkeeper at two schools, graduated from Manhattan College in 2009. His college coaching career began on Didier Orellana's staff at Manhattanville, which was 23-11-2 during Ciano's tenure. As a player, he spent one season at Central Connecticut State and then three at Manhattan,

where he is a cum laude graduate and was an Academic All-Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference honoree. He started 54 games in his college career, posting a 1.96 goals against average and earning one MAAC Defensive Player of the Week honor.

A native of Syosset, Long Island, where he was an All-County player in high school, Ciano coaches throughout the New York area, working with the Brooklyn Knights, Eastern FC, USSF Cosmos East Academy, Eastern New York North ODP, and Armonk Soccer Club as assistant coach and/or goalkeeper coach.

He has played for numerous clubs, including the Brooklyn Knights and Long Island Rough Riders in the United Soccer Leagues-Premier Development League.

UNBEATEN 1960 NAIA NATIONAL SOCCER CHAMPIONS

Unbeaten national champions. It's a name only a select few college teams in any sport have ever worn.

One of those teams was the soccer team from Newark College of Engineering in 1960.

That team from NCE, coached by J. Malcolm (Mal) Simon, in his sixth year, with assistance from Lou DeVito, and captained by Guy Cilento and Bill Garro, sailed through its schedule, winning all 10 games and outscoring the opposition, 41-9. They allowed more than one goal in a game just twice (4-2 win over Trenton State and 5-3 win over Drew).

Facing Pratt in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) Area #3 championship at Stevens in Hoboken, NJ, the Highlanders came out ahead, 2-1, earning a spot in the national semifinals.

The last two rounds of the national tournament were hosted by Slippery Rock State in Pennsylvania

and the last two games proved to be the most challenging.

In the national semifinals, it took two overtimes, but Fitchburg State of Massachusetts became NCE's 12th victim in as many starts--3-2, NCE.

All the tension of the semifinal match turned out to be prologue, as the championship game against Elizabethtown College of Pennsylvania on November 26 proved even more suspenseful still.

In the end, the NCE and Elizabethtown played on and on through four goals, regulation time and four overtimes. Finally, nature stepped in, as darkness brought things to a halt with the score tied 2-2 after 16 minutes, 45 seconds of overtime play.

The NAIA declared the two teams co-national champions and the Highlanders ended their season with both an unbeaten record (12-0-1) and a national championship.

The roster of that 1960 team was a true reflection of New Jersey, as every player resided in the

Garden State. Indeed, most of those were from the immigrant-rich communities in the region, which nurtured a level of play not found in many other parts of the country.

Twelve different players scored goals that year, paced by John Savicky, with nine. Andy Handwerker scored eight, while Anatole Kulyk and Ed Cruz added six apiece.

After the season, halfback Werner Zorn was named as NCE's first NAIA All-American, an honor he would repeat in 1961. Zorn, Savicky and Handwerker were all-area and Alex Khowaylo was selected as the outstanding NAIA goalkeeper.

Unbeaten national champions. It sounds just as sweet 50 years later and counting.

Many members of the 1960 team were still part of the Highlanders the following year, when NCE again completed the regular season undefeated. The Highlanders returned to the national championship game, but lost to Howard University (an annual foe to this day since both teams have become NCAA Division I programs). That 1961 championship loss to Howard came with just 18 seconds remaining in regulation time. From 1960 to 1962, NCE amassed a three-year combined record of 26-2-1.

Notes: NCE changed its national affiliation from NAIA to NCAA Division III in 1974. The university changed its name to NJIT in 1975. The Highlanders reclassified within the NCAA to Division II in 1997 and to Division I in 2004.

THE RICH HIGHLANDERS SOCCER LEGACY

Hernan "Chico" Borja

Spread NJIT's Name Around the Globe



Hernan Borja was an all-America soccer player in his career at New Jersey Institute of Technology from 1977 to 1980 under coach Mal Simon.

For more than a decade, Borja carried NJIT's name with him around the world as a professional player, first with the famed Cosmos of New York and then as one of the greatest indoor soccer players of his era.

From NJIT, the man known as 'Chico' would earn a spot on one of the world's most famous club teams, the Cosmos, as well as a regular spot on the United States National Team throughout the 1980's and also a career as one of the greatest indoor soccer players in world history.

With apologies to the baseball Yankees, it's quite likely that when it came to worldwide recognition, the most famous US-based team in any sport in the 1970's and 1980's was the Cosmos of the North American Soccer League.

In addition to playing in front of crowds exceeding 70,000 at Giants Stadium, the Cosmos routinely drew sellout crowds during tours to four continents. The club

home of all-time greats Pele and Franz Beckenbauer, the Cosmos lineup was studded with world-class stars from South America and Europe. Among the regular attendees at Cosmos home games were celebrities ranging from Mick Jagger to Henry Kissinger.

Hernan 'Chico' Borja stepped from the fields of NJIT into the Cosmos spotlight, playing regularly and frequently starting for the famed club in 1981, 1982 and 1984.

When the Cosmos and the NASL departed the scene, Borja moved to the indoor game with the Major Indoor Soccer League, the top indoor circuit in North America until 1992. Borja was one of the greatest players in that league's 14-year history, finishing fourth all-time in assists (338) and eighth in total points (612).

His greatness as an indoor star was underscored in 1992, when FIFA, the world's governing body for all soccer, named him to its all-World Championship first team for futsal, FIFA's 5 v 5 official indoor game.

He remained active in the outdoor game throughout and it was rare for the United States National Team to play a game without him in the lineup at any time during the 1980's. He was a starter in full

international competition in 1982, 1983, 1984 (3 matches), 1985 (2 matches) and 1988 (4 matches).

Playing for Team USA, he scored goals in three different full international matches, first finding the back of the net in a 2-0 win over Haiti on April 8, 1983. He later scored one of the two US goals in a 2-1 win over Trinidad and Tobago on May 15, 1985, in a qualifying match for the 1986 World Cup. Finally, he scored the only goal for the United States in a 3-1 loss vs. Chile on June 3, 1988.

He remains active in soccer as a coach and two of his former players, Oshane Moodie and Brian Caine came north from Florida to NJIT, where they began playing as freshmen in 2007.

Chico was not alone in earning all-America honors for NJIT (NCE). Indeed, he is one of 12 players to receive the coveted recognition playing for the Highlanders.



NCE/NJIT ALL-AMERICANS

Here is a brief look at the other nine all-Americans, with notes from their induction into the NJIT Hall of Fame:

Werner Zorn, 1960, 61



Werner Zorn, a soccer player from 1958-61, was Newark College of Engineering's first all-American and a key member of the 1960 NAIA national championship soccer team. NCE was NAIA national runner-up in 1961.

Alex Khowaylo, 1962



Alex Khowaylo, a soccer player from 1960-63 was an outstanding goalie for the soccer team at Newark College of Engineering from 1959 to 1962, including being named "all-American" and winning the NAIA national championship in 1960. NCE was NAIA national runner-up in 1961.

John Rapsomanikis, 1963



John Rapsomanikis, was a member of the men's soccer team from 1960-63.

Myron Worobec, 1964



Myron Worobec, was an outstanding soccer player at Newark College of Engineering from 1962-65. A prolific scorer he was named all-East, all-Area, all-America, a member of the U.S. Pan American team and a member of the U.S. Olympic team.



Myron Bakun, 1965, 66

Myron Bakun, was inducted into the NJIT Athletic Hall of Fame for his outstanding contributions as a soccer player at Newark College of Engineering from 1964-66, including being selected two-time all-American, the region's Most Valuable Player, and team captain. His soccer and leadership abilities were a model for all to follow.



Ali Hubey, 1969, 70, 71

Ali Hubey, a member of the 1969-71 men's soccer team was inducted into the NJIT Athletic Hall of Fame for his performance on the field which earned him all-American recognition for three consecutive seasons 1969, 1970, 1971. He was team MVP in 1970 and was named to the NJIT/NCE Centennial all-time soccer team.



Fabian Hurtado, 1971, 74 (HM)

Fabian Hurtado was inducted into the NJIT Athletic Hall of Fame as the holder of career scoring records with 65 goals and as first-team all-American in soccer in 1974. He was all-State and all-Area for three years and all-NAIA in 1973. He remains the all-time record-holder in the NAIA Tournament for most shots in a game, firing 18 against Goshen of Indiana in 1973. Hurtado went on to play professionally, including a stint in 1975 with the Dallas Tornado of the old North American Soccer League, which was the top league in North America.



Joe Dias, 1975 (HM)

Joe Dias, a soccer player from 1973-76, his performance earned all-America honors in 1976 as well as all-Area and all-State in both 1975 and 1976, he finished with 34 career goals placing him third all-time.



Kenneth Hammond, 1977 (HM)

Kenny Hammond, was an outstanding soccer player from 1974-77. His team reached three NCAA Tournaments and had a combined record of 35-15-2. Among NJIT's top 10 all-time goal scorers, he earned Honorable Mention all-America honors in 1977 and went on to play three seasons of professional soccer.



Andrew Bakun, 1981

Andrew Bakun, was inducted into the NJIT Athletic Hall of Fame for his outstanding achievements as an athlete in soccer from 1978-81. A four-year starter, Bakun was a versatile performer. He played three positions during his career at NJIT, earning all-State honors as a sophomore and all-Area accolades his junior year. He earned the 16th all-American award in NCE/NJIT men's soccer history following his senior season of 1981. Bakun scored eight career goals.



Raymond Paulius, 1983

Ray Paulius played soccer at NJIT from 1980-83, during which time the Highlanders posted a combined record of 36-26-2. In 1983, he was honored as a first-team all-America and is one of two men in school history to earn first-team all-America recognition in NCAA Division III from the National Soccer Coaches Association of America. Paulius was a quad-captain and all-American his senior year. The team MVP in 1983, Ray was first-team all-State and all-Region honoree that year as the Highlanders advanced to the finals of the ECAC postseason tournament.

BY CAR

New Jersey Turnpike: Driving North from South Jersey: Take NJ Turnpike to Exit 13A Newark Airport. After toll stay to left and follow signs to Rt. 1 & 9 North. You will merge onto Rt. 1 & 9 North. Airport will be on right. Follow signs for downtown Newark and Rt. 21 North- (left lane exit ramp). Downtown Newark will be in front of you. NYC will be off to your right. Follow Rt. 21 North (McCarter Highway). Turn left on Raymond Blvd. Follow Raymond Blvd. past Warren Street traffic light and Fleisher Athletic Center, Naimoli Center, and Lubetkin Field at J. Malcolm Simon Stadium will be to your right (one soccer goal line runs along Warren Street and the soccer sideline parallels Lock Street).

New Jersey Turnpike: Driving South from North Jersey: Take exit 15W to Route 280 West, then follow Route 280 West directions.

Route 280 West: After drawbridge, take Exit 15A (Rt. 21 South - McCarter Highway). Follow Rt. 21 South to Raymond Blvd. Turn right on Raymond Blvd. Follow Raymond Blvd. pass Warren Street traffic light and Fleisher Athletic Center, Naimoli Center, and Lubetkin Field at J. Malcolm Simon Stadium will be to your right (one soccer goal line runs along Warren Street and the soccer sideline parallels Lock Street).

Route 280 East: Take Exit 15 (Rt. 21 South - McCarter Highway). Follow Rt. 21 South to Raymond Blvd. Turn right on Raymond Blvd. Follow Raymond Blvd. past Warren Street traffic light and Fleisher Athletic Center, Naimoli Center, and Lubetkin Field at J. Malcolm Simon Stadium will be to your right (one soccer goal line runs along Warren Street and the soccer sideline parallels Lock Street).

Garden State Parkway (North & South bound): Take exit 145 to Route 280 East, then follow Route 280 East directions.

Route 1 & 9 North & South: Take exit marked Newark, Rt. 21 North (McCarter Highway). Follow Rt. 21 North (McCarter Highway). Turn left on Raymond Blvd. Follow Raymond Blvd. past Warren Street traffic light and Fleisher Athletic Center, Naimoli Center, and Lubetkin Field at J. Malcolm Simon Stadium will be



to your right (one soccer goal line runs along Warren Street and the soccer sideline parallels Lock Street).

Route 78 East: Take Route 78 East to Rt. 21 North. Turn left on Raymond Blvd. Follow Raymond Blvd. past Warren Street traffic light and Fleisher Athletic Center, Naimoli Center, and Lubetkin Field at J. Malcolm Simon Stadium will be to your right (one soccer goal line runs along Warren Street and the soccer sideline parallels Lock Street).

Route 22 East: Take Route 22 East to Route 21 North. Turn left on Raymond Blvd. Follow Raymond Blvd. past Warren Street traffic light and Fleisher Athletic Center, Naimoli Center, and Lubetkin Field at J. Malcolm Simon Stadium will be to your right (one soccer goal line runs along Warren Street and the soccer sideline parallels Lock Street).

Route 21 North: Follow Rt. 21 North to Raymond Blvd. Turn left onto Raymond Blvd. Follow Raymond Blvd. past Warren Street traffic light and Fleisher Athletic Center, Naimoli Center, and Lubetkin Field at J.

Malcolm Simon Stadium will be to your right (one soccer goal line runs along Warren Street and the soccer sideline parallels Lock Street).

Route 21 South: Follow Rt. 21 South (McCarter Highway) to Raymond Blvd. Turn Right on Raymond Blvd. Follow Raymond Blvd. past Warren Street traffic light and Fleisher Athletic Center, Naimoli Center, and Lubetkin Field at J. Malcolm Simon Stadium will be to your right (one soccer goal line runs along Warren Street and the soccer sideline parallels Lock Street).

New York Thruway: Thruway to Exit 14A, Garden State Parkway. Follow Garden State Parkway directions above.

George Washington Bridge: NJ Turnpike South to Exit 15W. Follow Route 280 West directions above.

Lincoln Tunnel: West on Rt. 3 to Rt. 21 South. Turn right onto Raymond Blvd. Follow Raymond Blvd. past Warren Street traffic light and Fleisher Athletic Center, Naimoli Center, and Lubetkin Field at J. Malcolm Simon Stadium will be to your right (one soccer goal line runs along Warren Street and the soccer sideline parallels Lock Street).

From Brooklyn, Queens and Long Island: Take Verrazano-Narrows Bridge (Interstate 278) and follow 278 across Staten Island. Cross Goethels Bridge. Follow signs to New Jersey Turnpike North then follow New Jersey Turnpike directions above.

PARKING

Bus/Van Parking: Visiting buses and vans may usually park on Lock Street adjacent to the athletic center. Please be careful not to block the parking space reserved for the doctor.

Visitor Parking: Visitor parking may be reserved in advance through your host. Otherwise, visitor parking at NJIT is available in the NJIT parking deck. Turn right onto Warren Street. Turn right onto Colden Street and proceed around the block to Summit Street. Parking Deck entrance is located to your right before the intersection with Warren Street.

Parking for on-campus athletic contests: NJIT is offering free off-street parking for fans attending regular season home soccer and volleyball matches and basketball games. The parking entrance, marked by a yellow sign is located on New Street.

OTHER TRANSPORTATION SYSTEMS

Newark Liberty International Airport: Minutes from the NJIT campus. A minibus (Newark Airlink) or taxi service connects the airport with Penn Station in Newark. Bus, Newark Light Rail, and taxi connections are available at the station.

Newark Penn Station: Located in downtown Newark, connections to the NJIT campus may be made by bus, Newark Light Rail, or taxi.

Morris & Essex Broad Street Station: A five-block walk to the NJIT campus via MLK Boulevard to Central Avenue. Taxi service is also available.

Newark Light Rail: From Penn Station in Newark, take the Warren Street stop for the NJIT campus. The Warren Street stop is on the sidewalk behind the press box for Lubetkin Field at J. Malcolm Simon Stadium.
