ANNUAL REPORT 2022 - 2023

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Dear Students, Faculty, Colleagues, and Friends of the NJIT Library,

July 1, 2023, marked my sixth year as your University Librarian, and I am pleased to share this year's report with you, the NJIT community. First and foremost, the NJIT Library staff and I take great pride in presenting a comprehensive 2022-2023 annual report of our accomplishments. The report highlights our continuous efforts in supporting the University's learning, teaching, and research ecosystem. Thanks to our dedicated student staff, library staff, professional librarians, and leadership team, the NJIT Library continues to be rated as one of the most popular spaces for students to collaborate, gather, learn, and share knowledge outside the classroom environment.

The pandemic has left us with a changed world. Now, more than ever, we must assume that business as usual will be punctuated by unforeseen events, and plan accordingly. As a result, we must expand beyond growth and innovation to address risk and prepare for what may be ahead. Technology has garnered increased attention, transforming from a helpful learning tool to an indispensable part of the higher education infrastructure. With the explosive growth and public adoption of artificial intelligence (AI) tools, particularly generative AI, librarians must continue to monitor, learn, and adopt this new technology to provide education and guidance to students appropriately.

The NJIT Library is committed to continuing and expanding the success of the university through various projects we have completed throughout the fiscal year. We crafted a new 2024-2026 strategic plan, published a faculty-authored open textbook, completed the renovation of the Research Help Desk to create a more collaborative space for small group instruction, and collaborated on applying for a JBOC grant to renovate and transform the Van Houten Library with a focus on student success through a transformation of the library space. We introduced events to increase engagement with the NJIT community, especially with undergraduate students. We dedicated staff resources to increase efforts on special collections and archives and continued to add digital assets to the institutional repositories. Through strategic negotiations with vendors, we secured 47 additional electronic resources. We migrated from patron barcodes to an RFID technology reader to lend library materials. We partnered with the IST Division to install laptop lending and charger kiosks to support student learning anytime and anywhere. With support from the IST division, the library staff received new laptops, enabling them to have the appropriate tools for working remotely.

The Littman Library continued providing new tools and technologies to support its Digital Scholarship Lab, increased collection development efforts, and reference and instruction activities. The demand for additional events and exhibits was heard. The curated exhibitions "Homes for All: Architecture Combating the Housing Crisis," "New Trends in Housing," "Representational Techniques," and "Women in Architecture Art and Design" were well attended and received by the NJIT community.

We welcomed Tyvonnia Braxton, Library Assistant I; Kennedy Jones, Architecture, Art, and Design Librarian; and Luci Parrish, Library Access Services and Outreach Coordinator. We said goodbye to Alex Eud, Aimee Calderon Martinez, and Tim Valente.

In 2024 and beyond, we need to focus on developing institutional resilience while continuing to support student success and research innovation. Reflecting on our efforts, challenges, opportunities, and successes, I am grateful for the opportunity to continue as your chief librarian and a member of the NJIT community.

The Library staff and I look forward to continuing our partnership with NJIT's academic community and administration to enhance our student learning experience, faculty research, and lifelong success. As always, I welcome and appreciate your feedback.

DEVELOPMENT OF THE NEW STRATEGIC PLAN 2024-2026

The NJIT Library is the scholarly center of NJIT and plays a critical and highly visible role on campus to assist with advancing the university's mission and vision by supporting the research, teaching, and learning efforts of the university. The Library is vital to the university's research and learning ecosystem. The Library connects users with rich and diverse resources. The Library fosters meaningful learning experiences. The Library provides innovative research support for a diverse user population.

NJIT requires a 21st-century research library. It is critical for the Library to be an organization that provides a top-notch service-oriented mission and vision to support the new strategic plan, "Building on a Strong Foundation - NJIT 2025." There was an opportunity to restructure the library with several key vacant positions during FY2021. The new structure mandated hiring new departmental leaders and key vacant positions, which was accomplished during FY2022. Throughout the fiscal year 2023, the newly formed library leadership team worked on revising the mission statement and creating a vision, core value, and goal statement. The Associate University Librarians presented this information to the staff at the May 17, 2023, staff retreat.

OPEN ACCESS TEXTBOOK PROGRAM

A Library team comprised of Matt Brown, Ann Hoang, Jennifer King, John Kromer, Jill Lagerstrom, and Lisa Weissbard worked with Dr. John Carpinelli, a professor of Electrical and Computer Engineering, to publish his open textbook. An Animated Introduction to Digital Logic Design is the first publication of the Faculty Authored Open Textbook (FAOT) program, part of NJIT's Open and Affordable Textbook Program, and was supported by NJIT's Sabbatical Leave Award.

The uniqueness of this FAOT text is the extensive use of animation to help students understand the concepts. The animations used still diagrams (.gif, .tif, .vsdx) to generate the illusion of movement, which are integrated into multimedia files (.mp4).

Dr. Carpinelli's book is designed for use in an introductory course on digital logic design, typically offered in computer engineering, electrical engineering, computer science, and other related programs. Such a course is usually offered at the sophomore level. This book makes extensive use of animation to illustrate the flow of data within a digital system and to step through some of the procedures used to design and optimize digital circuits. The book is stored on NJIT Library's Digital Commons.

History of the NJIT OAT Program

The NJIT Open and Affordable Textbook (OAT) Program began in 2017 with the goal of encouraging NJIT faculty to redesign their courses using open textbooks, free or low-cost materials, library resources, or open educational resources (OER) instead of commercial texts to increase course material affordability for NJIT students.

To help realize this vision, various strategies are being used to expand the use of OER in as many courses as possible. The OAT Program plays an important role by communicating and raising awareness of OER to the NJIT community (which includes faculty, administration, and students) and by providing incentives for instructors to adopt open materials in place of a required commercial textbook.

Due to staff transitions, the program was paused from 2020-2023. However, it is starting again in AY2023-2024 by providing awards to faculty instructors interested in adopting OER or low-cost resources instead of a required textbook in their courses. PROPOSED RENOVATIONS FOR THE VAN HOUTEN LIBRARY

Last year, NJIT was provided an opportunity to seek grant funds from the New Jersey Joint Budget Oversight Committee (JBOC) to renovate the Van Houten Library. The project's focus was on Student Success through digital transformation.

This project sought to modernize the Robert W. Van Houten Library, a 56,256 square foot space built in 1992, into a contemporary Digital Learning Commons exploration hub, enabling the advancement of knowledge, supporting the needs of future generations, and adhering to the values of higher education.

The goal of the library is to create learning spaces that extend beyond the classroom. The library supports the creation and consumption of content in a low-stakes environment of flexible and informal spaces.

The first floor would be reconfigured to allow 24/7 library access while maintaining the safety and security of the students.


The remaining floors would be transformed from the traditional library look and feel into an exploration hub serving as an intellectual center for students and faculty with shared interests to meet, socialize, and work collaboratively and informally and as the traditional location for accessing published information.

The physical transformation would reduce the existing bookshelves and journal racks to clear the way for public, semi-private, and private collaboration spaces.

Unfortunately, NJIT did not receive the necessary grant funding during FY2023. There will be more opportunities to renovate the NJIT Library in the future.

COMMITTEE ON INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY, LIBRARY AND ACADEMIC RESOURCES (CITLAR)

The Committee on Information Technology, Library and Academic Resources (CITLAR), a standing committee of the NJIT Faculty Senate, was co-chaired by the Vice Provost & Chief Information Officer and the University Librarian. The committee membership is comprised of faculty representatives from 17 academic departments, IST staff, and librarians. CITLAR is responsible for reviewing, discussing, and making recommendations concerning strategies, policies, and services relating to academic use of technology, information technology, and library services and resources.

In 2023, the committee addressed and discussed these highlighted topics: FY2023 IST strategy, classroom improvements and upgrades, cybersecurity, data management support including IEEE DataPort for managing large datasets, ChatGPT, and OpenAthens authentication for library resources. The committee ranked journals and databases as part of the annual renewals process, approved the Streaming Media Licensing Policy, and were an integral part of the initial discussions of the high performance computing (HPC) servers for research computing, the laptop lending kiosk, the two-factor authentication (2FA) process, and the licensing of Overleaf (an online collaborative publishing tool based in LaTeX).

RESEARCH, ENGAGEMENT, AND ACCESS SERVICES HIGHLIGHTS

Research and Instruction Team

The Research & Instruction team of librarians had a busy year! The team of Jill Lagerstrom, Joe Mercuri, Quinn Morris-Pearson, Jennifer King, and John Kromer taught 3,309 students across 146 classes and orientations, fielded 952 reference questions, and completed 19 cited reference searches for faculty members going up for promotion and tenure. The team also represented the Library at open houses and other events like Earth Day.

In Spring '23, our librarians worked closely with ENGL621. This new class was designed for graduate students, especially those for whom English is not a primary language, to focus on growth in writing for publication (journal articles, dissertations, technical reports, etc.).

Research Help Desk Renovation

In summer 2022, the reference desk underwent a renovation which reduced the footprint of the desk itself in order to create space for collaborative work and small group instruction. New lighting was installed to brighten the area. In preparation for removing shelving in the area, the librarians evaluated the Ready Reference collection to reduce it to what was not available online and what was most likely to be immediately needed at-hand.

Research Guides are created by our librarians to aid students in finding the best possible resources for their research. The guides support the information literacy program and course curriculum, ranging in topics from "AI Futures" to "Resources for Industrial Designers." They provide valuable information to both students and faculty. There are 311 guides and from July 1st, 2022 - June 30th, 2023, there were 290,221 views. October 2022 had the highest amount of views at 33,800.

TECHNOLOGY, COLLECTIONS, AND PRESERVATION HIGHLIGHTS

Institutional Repository & Digital Commons

The 2022-2023 fiscal year was a productive year for digital projects. 465 items (42,335 pages) were scanned as digital assets. These included 446 theses, 9 archival items, 4 yearbooks, and 6 course catalogs.

The Library uploaded 523 documents to the institutional repository, Digital Commons (https://digitalcommons.njit.edu/). Included are: 264 theses and dissertations, 129 video files in support of the Open and Affordable Textbook Program, 118 syllabi, 10 yearbooks, and 2 course catalogs. The administrators from various units around campus uploaded an additional 86 documents (36 syllabi, 37 STEM articles, and 13 journal articles).

In the year ending June 30, 2023, content from our repository was downloaded 293,967 times with theses and dissertations accounting for 135,944 of the downloads and syllabi accounting for another 148,164.

Archives & Special Collections

The Library hired a Part-Time Archivist, Mary French, to create finding aids and process donated materials. The following collections were identified and processed: The Anthony H. Lamb (NTS 1927, NCE 1930) Collection and the Eberhardt Collection. Pictured below is Thacher's Cylindrical Slide Rule from the Frederick L. Eberhardt Collection, believed to be used for engineering and business calculations in the family's Newark-based machinery manufacturing firm. Additionally, more than 400 of Edward Weston's technical drawings were inventoried.

With the help of student assistants, Archivist and Digital Initiatives Librarian Matthew Brown was able to complete the transcription of 58 pages of the final Newark Technical School (NTS) scrapbook (191?-1918) and the first 77 pages of Weston correspondence related to the 1885 Franklin Institute Electrical Exhibition. The content is accessible on on the Digital Commons institutional repository.

TECHNOLOGY, COLLECTIONS, AND PRESERVATION HIGHLIGHTS

New Electronic Resources

In the last year, thanks to the tireless work and savvy negotiations made by our Electronic Resources and Discovery Librarian, Jennifer King, we were able to add new databases to our collection that will significantly expand our NJIT community's academic research resources. In particular, the addition of ProQuest One Academic (which includes 47 databases) has greatly expanded our database collection and, by extension, our students' options as they research at a high level.

New Laptop Lending Kiosk

Information Services and Technology Division (IST) and the Library collaborated to install a Laptop Lending Kiosk, housed outside the Van Houten Library, which has allowed students to check out laptops and chargers as needed and has proved to be a popular feature in the Van Houten lobby. The laptops were borrowed a total of 3,734 times and the chargers were borrowed a total of 1,463 times.



Revised Guest Computer Use Policies

The Library collaborated with IST to limit guest access to select computers and distribute daily passwords to library staff. This ensured that NJIT students have priority for the computer lab during high-traffic times while still providing a way to serve the Library's public guest patrons well. The librarians and staff also revised the Library's guest policy to reflect these and other suggested changes.

RFID Card Readers

To align with NJIT's move to RFID card access, the Library moved away from the traditional barcode sticker method to check out materials and instead implemented the faster, touchless RFID system for checkout.

The university's chip-embedded ID cards for all students, faculty, and staff have allowed us to eliminate the need for affixing a separate barcode on the back of a patron's ID card.

The librarians and IST have integrated RFID card readers to read the chip-embedded ID card to identify patrons. They have also equipped the laptop kiosk with an RFID card reader and integrated it with the library management system.

The RFID card reader integration has improved user experience by significantly reducing transaction time.

Website and New Laptops for Staff

The librarians and Strategic Communications recently updated the library website to make the site more intuitive and user-friendly and IST updated the hardware to make the site run efficiently, especially during heavy usage.

Mobile device users can view web content more quickly, including the interlibrary loan system. They also upgraded the Primo discovery layer web pages to meet industry compliance.

Additionally, each of our staff members received a new laptop and monitor from the university this year, to be replaced every four years. These laptops support remote access and allow for remote work days and replaced the older generation computers and operating systems that the staff computers previously used.

THE LITTMAN LIBRARY HIGHLIGHTS

This year proved to be successful for the Littman Library which was able to achieve remarkable outcomes, leading to high satisfaction with library services among students and faculty at the Hillier College of Architecture and Design (HCAD). Furthermore, the National Architecture Accreditation Board (NAAB) announced that the Littman Library met all their requirements "with distinction," signifying the library's commitment to excellence and demonstrating how to meet goals making the best use of all of its resources. The librarians take immense pride in transforming the Littman Library into a unique and inclusive space, a vibrant hub for knowledge, culture, and social engagement, and a welcoming and supportive environment that fosters learning, teaching, experimentation, and inspiration.

Digital Scholarship

With the support of the NJ Historical Commission (NJHC) grant awarded in 2021-2022, we collaborated with Prof. Hyejin Hannah Kum-Biocca and computer science students to develop the mobile app for the Digital Archive of Newark Architecture (DANA). This app received the 2023 New Jersey Library Association (NJLA) Innovation Technology Award. We also continued to develop the web version of the archive (http://dana.njit.edu).

Using the Littman Family endowment fund, we upgraded the Digital Scholarship Lab's equipment and organized an additional teaching station.




