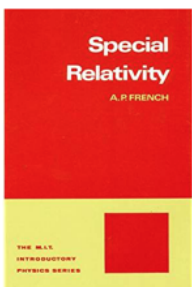

2. *Special Relativity* by A. P. French, The M.I.T. Introductory Physics Series, ISBN: 978-0-393-09793-1. This textbook will be referred to as **F**.



Lecture Quizzes: Starting on September 17, a lecture quiz will be given by the end of every Monday class. The quiz will contain 1 – 5 problems depending on the level of difficulty.
