The theme of the first annual NJIT homecoming parade was *Catch the Highlander Spirit*.





Tour de Tech was held on Sunday, October 20, the final event of the annual Family Weekend.








Tour de Tech



Tiernan Hall is located on the southern end of the Campus Green and houses classrooms and offices.


The Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center houses all of the University's physical education facilities and athletic programs. Renovated in 1990, the gymnasium features a swimming pool, racquetball courts, fitness center with an indoor running track, weight room and an aerobic dance room.













Redwood Hall was opened in 1979 in response to a demand for on-campus housing. It currently houses 250 freshmen.



Opened in 1992, the Central Avenue Building houses the Van Houten Library, School of Management and University Admissions.

The five-story, \$30 million Guttenberg Information Technologies Center was designed to provide state-of-the art facilities for education and research in manufacturing, robotics, information technology and telecommunications.





Laurel Hall was opened in 1997 and its newest extention was completed in the fall of 2001.



Oak Hall was opened in 1984. It is a coed facility that houses 265 full-time sophomore, junior, senior, and graduate students in furnished 2- and 3-person rooms and 5-person apartments.

Kupfrian Hall is named to honor Wilbur J. Kupfrian, a retired patent attorney, entrepreneur and a 1933 graduate who has donated one of the largest individual gifts in the University's 118-year history.

Letter from the President

This past year has been a good one; NJIT is a university on the rise. We recently completed a very favorable accreditation site visit by the Middles States Organization of Schools and Colleges. We gained Tier 2 status in the *U.S. News and World Report* survey, placing us in the top half of the leading national doctoral universities. With some \$60 million in research funding, we've also broken into "Top 200 American Research Universities" in total research expenditure, federal research expenditure and doctorates awarded, according to an annual study by The Center at the University of Florida. The study also shows NJIT with the nation's fastest growing research program and fastest growing endowment. We've been among the top 10 "most wired" campuses in the nation for five consecutive years. We recently completed the largest and most successful capital campaign in the university's history.

Construction of the new Campus Center and the multi-purpose building to house academic units, a number of service units, and parking, and which will allow for further expansion of the Library in its current location, is scheduled to be completed in September, at which time renovation of the Hazell Center and Eberhardt Hall, to serve as an Alumni Center, will begin. Our third business incubator, Enterprise Development Center III, opened in the fall in Science Park. This year saw a number of successful on-campus events, helping to build further a sense of community among the NJIT family, including Family Weekend in October, the Faculty/Staff Variety show in March, and Spring Week Carnival in April. The men's and women's basketball teams had one of the most successful seasons on record for each of them, the men's team finishing first in the conference. Additionally, plans are in progress to enhance athletics in general with the men's soccer team scheduled to play games in a Division I conference starting in fall 2003.

This year's graduating class was one of the largest and most accomplished in recent history. Nine graduating seniors earned perfect 4.0 grade point averages. Elaine Nicole Lalane, of Newark, was one of the few African-American women in the US to receive a doctorate in physics, and Darin Crumbley, 40, of Newark, graduated after 20 years of persevering through 15 operations and four kidneys.

Our university too has a long history of adapting its educational programs to the needs of industry, so that our graduates can succeed in the workforce. Our research programs emphasize the technologies with the greatest promise for commercialization and the applications that increase profitability and productivity. And intrinsic to the NJIT character are the flexibility and the entrepreneurial spirit that make the university so successful in partnering with industry and nurturing new businesses.

We look forward to another great year next year for those of you are returning. To the graduates, congratulations, and best wishes for success.

The Highlanders won 7 of their last 8 bouts to finish with a 9-5 record, marking the first winning season for the Highlanders in the last 11 years. 



WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

The Highlanders tied the school record for number of wins in a season at 16. They finished 4th in the 12-team Central Athletic Collegiate Conference for the second consecutive season with a 15-7 league record and reached the semifinals of the tournament. SchryKya Massey was named first-team all-CACC for the second consecutive season and was also a Metropolitan Basketball Writers all-star.


MEN'S TENNIS
