Course Description HUM101 is an introduction to college level writing. In this course, students are introduced to writing's rhetorical dimensions; they are asked to consider the purpose, audience, occasion, and genre that are called for in a variety of writing, speaking, or visual assignments. The course also focused on the writing process, including asking students to brainstorm topics, to write drafts, and to revise their writing based on feedback and reflection. Writing and reading go hand in hand, so students are asked to read challenging articles, essays, and prose, and to consider paintings, films, or other visual compositions. Academic writing begins from the assumption that written, visual, and spoken texts can be in conversation with each other. Thus, the readings serve as both models of effective communication and as beginning places for students' own arguments and analyses.

Prerequisites and Grade Requirements Permission of the Humanities Department is required to take HUM101. Entrance is determined by placement score or completion of HUM99 with a grade of C or better. To advance to HUM102, you must pass HUM101 with a C or higher final course grade.

Course Goals During this course, students will

- Gain knowledge of writing's rhetorical dimensions
- Use writing as a tool for critical thinking and reflection
- Practice writing as a process using various brainstorming, invention, revision and editing strategies
- Write in several genres that utilize analysis, reflection, narrative, critique, and argument skills
- Practice using the conventions of written, spoken, and visual composition

Attendance Attendance is critical to student success in HUM101. Participation in in-class activities, discussions, and workshops will contribute to your knowledge, ability, and performance. Professionalism can be demonstrated by regular attendance and active participation. At a minimum, this means attending on time, being prepared, and contributing to class discussions. Your level of engagement is directly related to how much you learn from the course.

You may have one week of unexcused absences, so in this case two classes, without penalty. Every subsequent absence will result in a ½ point deduction from your final course grade. The absence count includes lates, but not college approved absences. Your instructor makes final decisions regarding what qualifies as an excused absence.

Absences are for illness or real personal issues. They are not days off. Attend every class so that you may use your unexcused absences when you really need them. If you are absent, consult Canvas and a classmate so you can make up missed work.

If you are absent on the date an assignment is due, the assignment due date does not change. Extensions for due dates and decisions about what constitutes an excused absence are made entirely at the discretion of your instructor.

If you have not completed an assignment, and you are thinking of skipping class on its due date, please re-think that decision. Don't make a bad situation (incomplete assignment) worse by combining it with an absence and missed learning.

Assignment Submission All assignments will be submitted on Canvas, unless otherwise specified. Emailed assignments will not be accepted. You will occasionally be required to print an assignment; you can use free college printers in the campus center or library. Assignments are due at the start of class. Late assignments will only be accepted subject to a grade reduction, usually one grade step per day late. For example, an A paper that is submitted a day late will earn a B+ grade.

If you have an excused absence, or know in advance that you will need extra time to complete an assignment, please contact me before the due date.
