Course Description

This course is the laboratory component of STS 304 and must be taken concurrently. In this course, we will explore the scope of cyberpsychology research and practice a range of applied qualitative methods. You will have an opportunity to think critically about existing methods and practices in the field of cyberpsychology, including new and challenging questions related to ethics.

Course Objectives

Students enrolled in this lab will complete the course with proficiency in

- Designing appropriate questions for a qualitative research study
- Using a range of bibliographic research methods foundational to primary research
- Selecting effective tools for the collection of qualitative data
- Selecting appropriate analytical methods for qualitative data
- Use of computer-assisted qualitative data analysis software (CAQDAS)

- September Lab activities include research on current practices and issues in the field of qualitative research generally and cyberpsychology specifically. We will review literature on *research positionality* and *reflexivity*, as well as investigate the scope of the field. Assignments related to this module include the **reflexivity statement**, **source share-out**, and **scope of field presentation**.
- October and November activities include hands-on practice with bibliographic research, including advanced methods social researchers practice when beginning a new study. This

module also includes an introduction to institutional review boards (IRB) and the requirements social researchers undergo prior to conducting fieldwork. Assignments related to this module include **citation chaining**, and **CITI and Informed Consent documents**.

- At the end of the term, you will be asked to create a detailed overview of a research plan connected to your proposal for STS 304. This **lab report** will be due the first week of December, and will be discussed in more detail during the first month of class.
