Phil 337-451/453 World Religions

Course Description

This course explores the religion as part of human culture. It will cover what we know about religion from the earliest periods of human existence; the functions of religion in human life, the varieties of religious beliefs, practices, and experiences; how religion relates to other parts of culture; and the relevance of religion to modern societies. The course takes an anthropological perspective which considers all cultural phenomena as valid in their own contexts and requires the student to explore beyond the bounds of any personal beliefs without judgment or criticism. The class also looks at the religions of the world as they exist at the present time, exploring their cosmology, dogma, ritual, and myth.

Student Learning Objectives

- 1. Students will be able to define religion from an anthropological perspective.
- 2. Students will be able to explain the relationship between religion and culture.
- 3. Students will be able to define and give examples of shamanism, witchcraft, and sorcery.
- 4. Students will be able to discuss the universality of religion.
- 5. Students will be able to explain the common functions of all religions.
- 6. Students will demonstrate their knowledge of the world's major religions.
- 7. Students will be able to use the comparative method to analyze religious similarities and differences
