Course Description

This seminar will take us to lands around the world for a compassionate look at the concerns and celebrations of various cinematic movements and cultures. We will examine subject matter, dialogue, genre, and visual forms of the various films we view in an effort to understand what each country considers valuable and how those efforts contribute to the art of cinema (or the commodification). Considerations of race, class, gender and sexual orientation will be central to our discussions. Final projects can be created around subject matter or cinematic theme, movement or country.

Prerequisites

Course Goals

- To critically analyze international films and find common human themes much like we do in literature and then move beyond with film language.
- To examine film as an art and/or commodity.
- To apply theories of film in critical analysis to better understand how individual and national structures are composed.
- To learn to learn about film, searching for resources as questions arise in class discussion and from assigned readings and screenings.
- To make substantial contributions to the making of meaning unique to watching film.
- To develop an original research project that utilizes research techniques and composition to enter into a conversation about film.

Required Texts

There are no required textbooks for this course; however, expect to rent or purchase movies as your text for the course. Reading materials will be set up in pdf form on Canvas, including weekly required readings, book excerpts, websites, etc.

Assessment

Grade breakdown is as follows:

Participation and attendance

15%

Class participation includes regular attendance and engagement in class activities. A seminar course by nature depends on active engagement with the films and readings and interaction with one another. To succeed here you need to be both seen and heard in discussion. You must watch the movies and complete the readings before the class period for which it is assigned. Your withdrawal from discussion may be evidence that you are not prepared.

Activities may include whole group discussion/meaning making, discussion board writing, sharing of film clips, library research.

Listen carefully each class session to determine what is expected for the coming class. Some assignments may run longer (or shorter) so the schedule could need to be adjusted from the original plan.

In the event that online synchronous meetings become necessary, cameras are required for full participation.

Four 2-page mini-essays

5 x 4

Choose four of the films in our course schedule before November 1 and write four 2-page essays.

You write only 4 mini-essays and not a mini-essay for every film.

During three of the weeks shown below, you will work with the films, readings and discussion and your own research, to piece together **2-page mini-essays** which focus on **one aspect** of the film or topic for that week. These aspects may include one of the following: subject matter and themes, director, national cinema considerations, theory and/or close cinematic analysis using the tools you are collecting. If you work with more than one element, then there should be overlap/connections between the two. Cite all sources including the new ones that you find. **Summaries of the movie and literature review work with thematic elements only are not acceptable.** These mini-essays must show **critical film evaluation** at work.

Video essay

On one film element seen in several movies

Research essay with film analysis using film language:

Midterm presentation of proposed topic for final research essay	5%
Final research essay on a film technique, director, genre, or technical aspect (5-7 pages)	25%
Final presentation on research essay (maximum 12 minutes)	15%

This **5-7-page argument essay** should be densely packed using the tools and techniques you have built during the course to examine a particular film or other well-defined topic. You must include at least 4 academic sources as well as other appropriate film studies sources to complete this assignment and receive a grade.

We will work on these beginning early in the course and make frequent reference to how they may be structured and built. This should not be a hastily written essay pulled together in the last week but should show your careful calculations and creative thoughts from coursework throughout.

All written assignments must be submitted on Canvas (which automatically assesses for plagiarism using Turnitin).

Final grades are calculated on separate Excel sheets and not on Canvas. You will, however, be graded on mini-essays, final research essay, participation grades and presentation on Canvas. The total of grades on Canvas does not equal your grade for the course.
