Course Description: Introduction to the scientific study of behavior and mental processes. Includes topics such as research methods, the neurological bases of behavior, consciousness, sensation and perception, learning, memory, thinking and intelligence, personality, motivation and emotion, development, psychological disorders and social psychology.

- 2. Describe the various research methods and apply this knowledge to evaluate psychological research studies.
- 3. Articulate the importance and value of psychology in today's world.
- 4. Deliver clear and organized presentations and documents using APA style.

Course Content Areas:

Core Course Content Areas (we will augment these core areas with additional concepts):

Psychological theories:

Evolutionary Psychology and how evolution works, Functionalism, Structuralism, Psychodynamic theories (Freud and neo-Freudians), Behaviorism, Cognitive Psychology, Piaget's cognitive developmental theory, Erikson's psychosocial developmental theory, Vygotsky's sociocultural theory, Maslow's hierarchy of needs.

Research

Hypothesis, naturalistic observation, correlational research, experiments, placebo effects, independent, dependent and confounding variables.

Brain, Perception, and Consciousness

How neurons work, neurotransmitters, frontal, occipital, parietal, and temporal lobes. How information is transformed from sensory to perception, stages of sleep, hypnosis.

Learning, Memory, and Intelligence

Schemas, assimilation and accommodation, classical conditioning (UR, US, CR, CS, NS, Discrimination, Generalization), operant conditioning (positive and negative reinforcement, punishment, shaping), observational learning (including brain mirror neurons), how memory works (sensory, short term memory, long term memory), strategies to improve memory, intelligence (Gardner, Sternberg, emotional intelligence).

Abnormal Psychology

DSM –IV, Schizophrenia, Dissociative Identity Disorder, Anxiety Disorders (Generalized Anxiety Disorder, Obsessive Compulsive Disorder, Panic Disorder, Phobia), Mood Disorders (Major Depression, Bipolar Disorder), Therapies (Psychodynamic, Behavioral, Cognitive, Humanistic, System, and Biological).

Participation/Discussions: Responding to the discussion posts is how you will receive this grade. All students must respond to the discussion prompt on specified Saturday's by 11:55pm. Response should be at least 1 / 2 (half) page to a maximum of 3 / 4 (three quarters) of a page. Also, once you submit your write-up, you must THEN respond to other classmates' responses 2 more times and agree /disagree with their responses with a valid response. This accounts for a total number of 3 submissions for the posted discussion . **ANY LATE ASSIGNMENT SUBMITTED WILL RESULT IN 25 POINTS.**

Homework: You will have a homework assignments due every week. You are expected to submit a reflection (summary) of each chapter read EVERY week. AT LEAST 1-2 pages typed double spaced. You are to give your input on the chapter and what you found to be significant in the chapter. **NO** heading on assignments please or 25 points taken off!! **ANY LATE ASSIGNMENT SUBMITTED WILL RESULT IN 25 POINTS. NO ASSIGNMENT SUBMITTED WILL RESULT IN A 0.**

Midterm Powerpoint: I will be asking for you to choose one specific chapter, choose a sub-section within the chapter and do a PowerPoint with at least 18-20 slides on the specifics including title and reference slide. As long as the powerpoint is detailed and creative based on topic that you choose, that is what I will be looking for. The last slide should be a reference page formatted into the proper APA format. Detail the specifics of the topic that interest you. Make sure that your presentation is creative – use color, pictures, graphs, video clip of no more than 30 seconds to a minute. You can choose any ONE chapter from the textbook and within the chapter, choose an important topic/issue. The textbook should be one of the sources used. You are free to go outside of the textbook and use other outside sources. I am looking for 2+ sources (cited). Once completed, you will upload the PowerPoint onto canvas under the Midterm Powerpoint tab of our course by 11:55pm on October 28th.

Final: Final will consist of a cumulative multiple choice exam. You will receive a study guide two weeks in advance to prepare. You will have 60 minutes to complete the exam within the 24 hour period on **December 9th**. The Final Exam will use Respondus Lockdown Browser and Monitor for academic integrity. Using Respondus LockDown Browser and a Webcam for Online Exams

Respondus LockDown Browser is a locked browser for taking exams in Moodle. It prevents you from printing, copying, going to another URL, or accessing other applications during a test. If a Moodle quiz requires that LockDown Browser be used, you will not be able to take the assessment or quiz with a standard web browser. You may be required to use LockDown Browser with a webcam (Respondus Monitor), which will record you during an online exam.

This course requires the use of Respondus LockDown Browser and/or Respondus Monitor with a webcam for the midterm and final online exams. The webcam can be built into your computer or can be the type that plugs in with a USB cable. Watch this short video to get a basic understanding of LockDown Browser and the webcam feature. 1. Download and install LockDown Browser from this link:

- 2. Once your download has finished, locate the "LockDown Browser" shortcut on the desktop and double-click it. (For Mac users, launch "LockDown Browser" from the Applications folder.)
- 3. You will be brought to the Moodle login page within the LockDown Browser, click "Login with your UCID" to log in with your NJIT UCID and password and then click Login.
- 4. Under "My courses", click on the course in which you have to take the exam that requires the LockDown Browser.
- 5. After you enter the course, find the exam and click on it.
- 6. A confirmation prompt will appear, click the "Start attempt" button. Once a quiz has been started with LockDown Browser, you cannot exit until the Submit all and finish button is clicked.
- 7. If you are required to use a webcam (Respondus Monitor), you will be prompted to complete a Webcam Check and other Startup Sequence steps.
