Course Description

From Page to Stage is an introduction to understanding the relationship between the literary nature of plays and how they are produced for the stage. Coursework will include reading, analyzing, and discussion of plays in class, viewing plays outside of class, and finally creating plays within the class structure.

Course Objective

The objective of the course is to foster knowledge of a play's elements and structure. The approach to this is hands-on with the first half of the course reading and analyzing and the second half of the course walking through the creative process.

Course Outcome

By the end of this course students should

- demonstrate knowledge of analyzing and interpreting scripts,
- increase their general knowledge about the theatrical world,
- develop practical skills presenting and designing theatre-related work,
- gain the ability and confidence to share their works with an audience,
- increase their abilities to work in a collaborative environment,
- and learn how to provided focused and useful critical feedback to classmates.

Class Policies

Attendance: Attendance is important for this course as most of the coursework will be discussions happening in class. Lateness and unexcused absences will be reflected in your grade. Final Project: The final project of the class will be a group project of creating and performing a 3-5 page play. Each group member will have different roles including playwright, actors, director, and designer. This will be performed the final day of class. It will be graded both as a group and individually.

Extra Credit: Work a minimum of 5 hrs on *Mr. Burns* in some capacity. You can help with sets, costumes, ushering (2 performances), etc. This will earn you an additional 3% for your grade. You <u>cannot</u> work 10 hrs and get 6%, but you are welcome to work more hours if you wish.
