Course Goals:

In this course you will learn to:

- Speak in front of an audience
- Use adequate volume
- Time presentations exactly
- Create a professional online appearance
- Keep your audience's attention
- Communicate in small and large groups
- Integrate visuals and videos

Textbook:

No Text is Required – all necessary materials will be provided via Canvas

Class Rules:

- **Attendance:** is **required** and is **graded:** 0-1 absences = 20 (highest score); 2 absences = 18; 3 absences = 16; 4 absences = 14; 5 absences = 12; 6 absences = 10; 7 absences = 8; 8 or more = 0. If you are absent due to illness or other problems, email me explaining the situation. Attendance is important because we need **audiences** and audience feedback.

Hints for Presentations:

- Research has shown that even though *we fear oral presentations more than death*, the fear is frequently not visible.
- When making slides, use images rather than text.
- When using slides, choose a font large enough to see from the back of the room (usually over 20 pts).
- If you have a soft voice, you must practice projecting, which will feel like shouting.
- You will control *timing* by *practicing*. Practice is essential – the more important the talk is, the more you should practice.
- When online - Pay attention to your webcam image (ie: light and background)
- **VEGA (Voice, Eye Contact, Gestures, Attitude)**

Culture Presentation – Think of a form of culture you especially love, such as a favorite food, music, clothing designer, author, movie, video game, sport, dance, art, technology. Present your culture topic to the class. Purpose: Practice preparing and doing a presentation in front of the class.	4-5 min.	5
Review Presentation Part 1, Brainstorming – This is a 3-part assignment, so choose a topic you like and want to share with others. Think of an entity, item or service to review for this presentation. Part 1 is to	1-3 min.	

brainstorm with the class to choose a topic. Each student will stand in front of the room, describe the idea or ideas they have and get feedback from the class. Purpose: brainstorming (with group) to choose a good thing to Review.		
Review Presentation Part 2, Full Presentation – Write and practice a 10 to 15 minute speech on your Review. Integrate the visuals and videos you have chosen. No video segment should be longer than one minute, although you can use several. After your speech, you must answer at least one question from the audience. The presentation order will be generated from a random list of numbers. Purpose: first formal speech with in-class peer review, combining oral presentation with images and video, focusing on volume and timing.	8-10 min.	15
Video Interviews – You will be given a list of difficult job interview questions. Choose two, compose your answers and then make a video of yourself answering the question. Upload the two videos to your NJIT YouTube account. Post the URLs inside the assignment in Canvas. Purpose: practice video persona, job interview questions, recording voice clarity.	1-2 min (2).	10
Peer Review of Assigned Presentations (PR) Listen to the presentations and interview answers from that are assigned to you. Write a detailed response in Canvas regarding their volume, quality of presentation, etc	As Required	5
Hometown Presentation – Tell us about your hometown or hometowns. Present your hometown topic to the class. Purpose: Practice preparing and doing a presentation in front of the class.	5-10 min.	10
Jobs Presentation Part 1, Brainstorming – Like with the RP, we start with a brief brainstorming speech. You can approach the topic from any angle – describe jobs you’ve had, jobs your parents have had, good jobs, bad jobs, jobs as they are portrayed on TV, jobs you want, etc. In this initial one to three minute brainstorming session, present the topics that you may use and get feedback from the class. Purpose: brainstorming and planning with group feedback.	1-3 min	
Jobs Presentation Part 2, Full Presentation –You will be graded on volume, timing, and interest. The presentation order will be generated from a random list of numbers. Write and practice your speech on your topic with visuals and videos. No video segment should be longer than one minute, although you can use several. Purpose: formal speech combining voice, video and/or other supporting elements, controlling volume, time and audience interest.	8-12 min.	25
TV News Group Presentation – Prepare a television newscast on real news or fake news (the group will collaborate on the subject-matter) in groups of four or five. Each newsperson should speak two to three minutes each, possibly with background images and/or videos running. A Project Manager is responsible for managing participants and reporting to me at the end. Purpose: practice working in a group, presentation skills, and/or dramatic skills.	6-12 min	10
